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# Bond Issue for Community-Senior Center

Des Moines residents will be voting next March on a \$4.85 million bond issue to build a new Community-Senior Center. The City has already acquired the fouracre site for the center at 2045 S. 216th St., adjacent to the new post office. The site was purchased with Community Development Block Grant funds.

The Community-Senior Center would have 19,900 square feet, including a dining/meeting hall that would seat up to 240. There would be three multi-purpose rooms, an arts and crafts room, children's

arcade, exercise room, computer technology room and senior services rooms. If approved in March, the facility would open in 2000.

The cost for taxpayers on the 20year bond would be 23 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The election will be a mail-in vote that will be due by March 9, 1999. Voters will receive their ballots in the mail twothree weeks earlier. The bond issue requires 60 percent voter approval for passage.

# New Post Office Opens at 2003 S. 216th St.

es Moines' new post office opened its doors to the public on Nov. 16. The new facility at 2003 S. 216th St. is 23,000 square feet, about twice as large as the former post office at 22203 7th Ave. S., which is now closed.

The additional space will enable all carriers for all 98198 postal routes to work out of the same building which should improve efficiency. Previously, carriers for 98198 routes worked out of the Riverton and Des Moines post offices.

The new facility has 1,300 post office boxes, compared to 800 in the old post office. There is additional counter space, a self-service vending machine area, and a retail area that features postal products. The post office is served by a new Metro route, No. 189.

Post office hours are 8:30 a.m. - p.m., Monday - Friday; 8:30 a.m. - 3 p.m., Saturday.

# New Land Use Policies, Zoning Proposed

Des Moines' planners are working with interested citizens and the City Council to plan for the future of the Pacific Highway South area. The study area includes both sides of Pacific Highway as far south as Kent-Des Moines Road. Discussions include the possibility of high-rise buildings containing condominiums over street-level retail.

Also in the planning stage is a new zoning map for the entire City. The existing map dates back to 1964, when the City was much smaller in size. Now, computer-drawn maps can provide better clarity, accuracy, and are easier to update over time.

This is also an opportunity to make the zoning map better match the City's Comprehensive Plan (a requirement of State law). As a result, the zoning of some properties may be changed to either a more restrictive or more permissive zone. The names of the zones may also be updated to better reflect their purpose and use. Notice of the public hearings for the new map will be mailed to the owners of affected properties.

# Street and Surface Water Maintenance

he City of Des Moines Street Maintenance crew has a large responsibility. The City has approximately 85 miles of streets. Seven maintenance workers have the responsibility to care for all City rights-of-way; that is over 12 miles per worker. Part of their mission is to maintain all streets, sidewalks, and open rights-of-way ensuring a safe environment for vehicle and pedestrian use. Some of the services provided are:

#### Road and Street Maintenance

Road and street maintenance includes road and shoulder repair, grading, graveling, pothole patching, and asphalt repairs.

#### **Traffic Control Measures**

This involves installing new signs, lights, and markings, as well as maintaining those that exist. This is done in an effort to safely guide the citizens and commuting public on our City's rights-of-way.

#### Roadside Vegetation

This service is to keep the rightsof-way beyond the curb or shoulder neatly trimmed and free of overhanging or intruding vegetation that may be a hazard or that impairs motorists' vision. The crews also remove trees that are dead or in some way could be dangerous to people or property. Other services include litter control, as well as snow and ice removal.

The other four members of the

Public Works Maintenance crew take care of surface water and storm drainage. Their mission is to maintain, protect, and improve the City's surface water and drainage systems. These crews do regular routine maintenance of City-owned storm water catch basins, closed pipe convevance systems, and above and underground detention facilities. Private facilities that have maintenance agreements with the City are also maintained. The crew also continues with the neighborhood pipe program. This program involves installing pipe into open ditches per an agreement between a requesting citizen and the City. Under this agreement, the citizen pays for the materials and the crew does the installation.

The typical citizen may not be aware of how large the system is with its huge quantity of pipe, thousands of catch basins, and several detention facilities. The crew is dedicated to improving the quality of the surface water that flows through our systems into our streams by doing the best job possible.

Other services provided include ditch cleaning, stream vegetation maintenance, minor repair of stream banks, litter control, and street sweeping. These services are intended to extend the life of the City's drainage system, to continue to minimize localized flooding, and to improve water quality by removing debris, pollutants, and sediment from the system.



# Are You Prepared for Winter?

Some climatologists are saying that because of La Nina, the Pacific Northwest may be facing the most severe winter in decades, with possible prolonged periods of cold temperatures and power outages. There are some things residents can do to be prepared for winter storms:

- Have an alternate heat source for your home - woodstove, fireplace, kerosene heater, etc. Natural gas heaters usually have an electric fan which makes them inefficient during power outages.
- Have an alternate cooking source such as a camp stove for use outdoors.
   (Never use a charcoal barbecue indoors; the fumes can be toxic)
- Protect pipes with insulation and outside faucets with Styrofoam covers.
- In extremely cold conditions, leave a faucet trickling to prevent freezing.
- · Stay indoors during windstorms.
- If pipes freeze, expose the frozen area to a heat source.

# Planning to Build a Fence?

any fences are constructed by Des Moines property owners each year. To many, fences are an important feature of home or property ownership and are built for a variety of reasons. Property owners often like to physically define or mark the limits of their property, and fences help achieve that. Fences also provide for a sense of increased security and privacy for residents whose homes or yards may be too exposed for personal comfort.


The City of Des Moines Community Development Department is frequently asked questions when it comes to building fences. The two most popular questions are: "Do I need a building permit?" and "Are there any regulations, restrictions or other things that I need to know before I decide to build a fence?"

A building permit is not needed to construct a fence provided that:

- The fence follows the normal contour or grade of the property involved; and
- The fence is not built together with a retaining wall constructed beneath the fence; and
- The fence is 6 feet or less in height and not located within the required front yard setback area.

Even though a building permit may not be required, there are a few additional things that property owners should do or know before starting to build a fence.

• Don't guess where your property lines are located. Build your fence only within your property if you do not have formal agreement with a neighbor. If you are not completely sure where your property lines are, have a survey performed or you may risk having to relocate or remove your fence.



- Talk to your neighbors and try to obtain a mutual understanding about where the common property lines are believed to be located if you want to save survey costs. Obtain written agreements or easements with each neighbor to avoid future disputes.
- Do not rely solely on existing fence lines, hedges, lawn edges, landscanbeds or other informal markers improvements to determine where your side or rear property lines are located.
- Do not rely solely on the location of fire hydrants, telephone poles, phone boxes, water meters, or the edge of sidewalks or street pavement to determine where your front property line is located.
- The property owner is ultimately responsible for having a fence built properly both in terms of its location and height. A contractor can build a fence, but he/she may not know where property lines are without a survey or what city codes are required for fence height or setbacks.

Call the Community Development Department at (206) 878-8626 for information about what height and setback requirements apply to the fence you plan to build. In some cases, a fence may be required to set back from a property line or height reduced depending on the exact circumstances involved with your property.

#### **AIRPORT COMMUNITIES COALITION**

#### Des Moines Amends Comprehensive Plan

In mid-October, the Des Moines City Council amended the City's Comprehensive Plan to specifically incorporate language from the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) as the primary point from which the City would exercise its authority to impose mitigation and/or deny approval of development projects. These amendments are intended to satisfy the Growth Management Hearings Board, which generally directed the City to articulate the yard stick it would use to review, approve, condition or deny a development project associated with an essential public facility, such as Sea-Tac airport. Other cities have adopted similar amendments to satisfy the Growth Board's requests.

The City expects that the Growth Board will dismiss the current challenge to the City's Comprehensive Plan. The odds of dismissal appear to be good. The Port of Seattle, which filed the pending challenge of the City's Comprehensive Plan with the Growth Board in early 1997, acknowledged that the City's SEPA-based amendments are consistent with state law. The amended Des Moines Comprehensive Plan retains the City's full permitting authority under SEPA to review and mitigate Port projects and activities with the City's jurisdiction.

#### **Federal Case Proceeds**

Oral arguments were heard recently in the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals kicking off the ACC's federal case against the Port's proposed third runway. The ACC seeks to invalidate the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA) approval of the third runway. The ACC believes that the FAA violated federal law governing airport development runway projects by failing to impose sufficient mitigation and has violated the federal Clean Air

Act by relying on a flawed and incomplete analysis of the project's adverse impacts on the region's air quality. The FAA approved the Port's third runway project in a July 1997 Record of Decision.

#### Wetlands Delay 3rd Runway

The Port of Seattle has withdrawn a state application to fill in wetlands to build a third runway at Sea-Tac airport delaying construction of the project. Delays in getting new permits could set back construction months, if not another year.

The Port of Seattle will need to submit a new Section 401 permit, hold new public comment periods and public hearings which will take several months. This process may push back the hiring of several key construction contracts until late summer 1999 which would caused the Port to miss another construction season.

The Section 401 permit requires that the Port survey the number of acres of wetlands to be bought, filled and leveled to build the third runway. Because the Port has acquired only a quarter of the properties needed to build the third runway, they are unable to determine the exact number of acres of wetlands that will need to be filled. The Port is required to purchase additional wetlands to offset the wetlands filled for construction.

The Section 401 permit is one of several permits required by the state of Washington before the Port can build the third runway. The Port had received initial permission from the state's Department of Ecology earlier this year. The Port also needs to acquire a section 404 permit from the US Army Corps of Engineers before it can disrupt wetlands. The Corps cannot act on the 404 application until the 401 certification is issued by the Department of Ecology.

# King County Dump Fees

King County will be raising fees for dumping garbage the first of the year. Because of those increases, Des Moines residents can anticipate their rates from SeaTac Disposal to go up slightly.




