In August the Des Moines City
Council voted to limit traffic operations on 8th Avenue South, between
Kent-Des Moines Road and South
223rd Street, to one-way in the
northbound direction to make the road
safer. This traffic revision was implemented on September 16th. To date,
the revision appears to be successful.
Overall volumes on 8th Avenue S.
have decreased as expected. A followup study will be conducted to evaluate
how the revisions continue to work.

Burglary, Hold Up and Panic Alarms Must be Registered

As required by Des Moines city ordinance, all residential and business burglary, hold up and panic alarms must be registered with the Des Moines Police Department. In addition, any alarm system, whether monitored or not, that emits an audible alarm that can be heard outside the building or business must also be registered. Your alarm company does not do this for you! Registration forms and information may be obtained on the City of Des Moines website at

www.desmoineswa.gov by clicking on the "Forms" section, or by calling the Des Moines Police Department at 206-878-3301, or by stopping by the Police Department, which is open 24 hours a day for your convenience.

EVERY YEAR you are required to submit a new registration form in order for the Police Department to ensure they have current contact information in case of an emergency. In addition, to the new registration form, there is also an annual \$25 registration fee

due. Currently, the penalty for failing to register an alarm is \$200 per year and a \$200 fine for each false alarm for a non-registered alarm system.

The alarm registration program has been highly successful as demonstrated by the reduction of false alarm calls by over 56% as compared to prior to the program's inception. This decrease in false alarms represents a significant cost savings to the Des Moines Police Department and the community.

Are You Ready to RUMBLE?

How prepared are you, your family and your neighbors for when a disaster strikes? Are you aware that it could take <u>days or weeks</u> before emergency personnel might reach you after a disaster?!?! Do you have an emergency supply kit, an emergency communications plan and are you aware of the potential emergencies that could occur where you live and the appropriate way to respond to them?



South King Fire & Rescue and the Des Moines Police Department have partnered to assist neighborhoods with organizing residents to be ready to take care of themselves and each other after a disaster. Starting a **Neighborhood Emergency Team (NET)** in your neighborhood will ensure that you, your family, and your neighbors are prepared and have a plan for when a disaster occurs. The free classes include Personal & Household Preparedness, Neighborhood Disaster Planning, a Neighborhood Walkabout (to identify neighborhood concerns), and a Team Drill.

The December 2006 windstorm was a natural disaster of historic proportions, which caused extensive damage to the Puget Sound region. The storm produced hurricane-force wind gusts and heavy rainfall, causing hundreds of millions of dollars in damage and leaving over 1.8 million residences and businesses without

power for several days. The good news is there is still time to prepare before another disaster occurs but you need to start **NOW**.

You Can Help Prevent Residential Burglary

The holiday season is just around the corner and the rush and good will that ensues can increase the opportunities for criminal activity. Burglary is a crime of opportunity; by taking a few extra precautions you can help protect your home from burglars.

- Keep doors and windows locked.
- Use your deadbolt locks, Charlie bars, and any other home security equipped in your home.
- Do not leave a spare key in the yard.
- Place gifts where they cannot be seen from the outside.
- Do not open the door to strangers.
- Do not put outgoing mail with money, checks, or gift certificates in your curbside mailbox.
- Put interior and exterior lights on timers.
- If you leave for an extended period of time, ask someone to watch your home for you.

Help Protect Our Water from Pollutants

As stormwater flows over driveways, lawns and sidewalks, it picks up debris, chemicals, dirt and other pollutants.

Stormwater can flow into a storm sewer system or directly to a stream, wetland, river, lake or coastal water. Anything that enters a storm sewer system may go unfiltered and untreated into waterbodies; the same water we use for swimming, fishing and most importantly for drinking. Polluted runoff is the nation's greatest threat to clean water.

It is illegal to discharge or dump any of the following into a storm drain or ditch:

washwater/liquid wastes; yard waste; pet waste; landscape irrigation flows; septic tank effluent; automotive hazardous waste; paint, car fluids, solvents and batteries.

Doing Business Locally Benefits Des Moines' Economy



In these tough economic times when consumer spending is down and tax revenues are declining, it is important to understand the value of doing business locally. Did you know that shop-

ping at local businesses can strengthen the quality of life and the economic vitality of Des Moines? First and foremost, it helps our local economy stay healthy and strong.

Growth of Des Moines' commercial tax base is essential to our City's financial viability. When you spend your dollars locally, *more money is kept in our community* because locally-owned businesses often purchase from other local businesses and service providers. There is a multiplier effect as you simultaneously *help grow other businesses*, *create jobs and fund more City services and improvements* through sales tax.

Did you know that there are 762 businesses operating in Des Moines? About 182 businesses are located in our

Downtown neighborhood. Based on recently published data in the South King County Economic Profile Report (Hebert Research, 2008), these businesses are primarily distributed among the services, retail trade, and finance, insurance and real estate sectors and employ about 7,538 people. The estimated total gross business income (GBI) in Des Moines for 2007 was \$652.2 million - this money helped us maintain local roads, parks and open space, as well as provide cultural and recreational programs and City services. Unique businesses are also an integral part of our distinctive character. Strolling the streets of Downtown, you would be surprised by the variety of small and independently owned businesses. They provide us with goods and services, ranging from specialty meats, wine, quilting supplies, yarn, jewelry, and books, to health care, professional services and numerous restaurants - so why go anywhere else? Economic research shows that entrepreneurs and skilled workers are more likely to invest and settle in communities that preserve their one-of-a-kind businesses and distinctive character. Although it is not always possible to buy everything you need from local businesses, if everyone purchased one more item or service locally, the effects would be tremendous.

Food Scrap

In an effort to reduce saturating our landfills with items that can be composted, effective January 2008 vegetative food scraps and food-soiled paper have been accepted for collection in yard debris carts!

Collection Instructions:

- Use the standard 96-gallon green yard debris cart to collect your yard debris, food scraps and food-soiled paper.
 Food scraps cannot be collected in cans with detachable lids.
- Excess yard debris (only) may be bundled or placed in compostable yard debris bags, or customer-owned 32gallon containers marked "Yard Debris". Regular plastic garbage bags will not be collected! (No food scraps may be collected in compostable bags that are not placed inside green yard debris cart.)
- Up to three 96-gallon carts of yard debris and food scraps may be set out bi-weekly (March – November) and once a month (December – February) for residents within the Des Moines city limits who subscribe to Allied Waste Yard Waste service.
- Yard debris carts may be rented from Allied Waste for a monthly fee of \$1.84 each.

Suggestions:

- To avoid odors and fruit flies you may opt to empty vegetative waste into the yard waste cart daily.
- Rinse kitchen container frequently.
- Line kitchen container with a used paper towel, paper bag, or newspaper.
- · Sprinkle baking soda in kitchen container.
- · Layer vegetative food scrap and yard waste in your cart.

Accepted Items for Food Scrap Collection:

Uncoated paper products (plates, bags, cups, napkins) pizza boxes, microwave popcorn bags, coffee filters, and tea bags, fruits and vegetables, bread, pasta, grains, eggshells, nutshells, coffee grounds

No meat or dairy products allowed in the food waste bin!!

Meet the City's Vehicle and Equipment Maintenance Department

The City's fleet of vehicles and equipment is serviced and maintained by two City mechanics, who together have more than 60 years of mechanical experience.

Rick Prall (Lead) and Don Leadbetter are responsible for repairing, servicing, buying and selling the City's fleet of 60 vehicles, 15 pieces of heavy equipment and 30 other miscellaneous items. Some of this equipment includes police cars, utility trucks, backhoes, a grader, shoulder mower, park mowers, asphalt roller, front end loader, crack sealer and much more.

The entire fleet is on a preventative maintenance schedule and is serviced as recommended by the manufacturer. Newer vehicles remain under warranty and are serviced at the dealership if necessary.

The shop is also responsible for ordering fuel and maintaining the fuel system distribution units.

The shop keeps an inventory of parts and items needed to maintain an efficient level of service, reducing the down time for equipment.



Good Sense Preventive Home Maintenance

It's that time of year again. Cold, stormy weather is on the horizon. As a homeowner, you should make certain preparations for this inclement weather.

Check to make sure the roof gutters are clean. Leaves may block drainage and cause the gutters to back up. This can damage the roof, cause leaks, and ruin the gutters themselves, especially if they fill with water and it freezes.

Check window and door seals. With the door closed, if you can see light between the door and the door jamb (top, bottom or sides), the door weather stripping needs to be replaced. Windows should be checked to see that they close tightly and have no cracks.

Change the filters in your forced air units as this will allow the return air to flow more freely, lessening the demand on the heater blower.

Last, be sure to check your exterior hose bibs. Make sure that they completely turn off and do not leak. This could prevent freezing later and save a lot of problems and expensive repairs.

Preventive maintenance can save energy and prevent costly repairs.
