




Celebrate the Holidays in Des Moines

Burien Azteca's Story:

Pepe Ramos grew up in Cuautla, Mexico, a small farm village in the state of Jalisco in Central Mexico where his father owned a grocery store. At age 12, having completed the sixth grade, Pepe had to leave school to help his father run the store so his other siblings would have an opportunity for more schooling. From working with his father, he acquired a foundation of skills--buying, selling, dealing with people, and working hard.

With a few pesos in his pocket and unable to speak a word of English, Jose (Pepe) Ramos, arrived in Seattle in 1973 to begin work as a dishwasher in his cousin's restaurant. Ramos' father had just died and it was Ramos' obligation as the eldest of five children to ensure the well being of his mother and his four siblings. He worked a 4 to 11 a.m. shift at Todd Shipyard and then arrived to his second job at the restaurant. From dishwasher to cook to chef, Ramos also worked hard at learning English. 

City's Sign Code Changed to Promote More Economic Development

THE DES MOINES CITY COUNCIL APPROVED 12 CHANGES TO THE CITY'S SIGN CODE on August 8, 2013 following two public hearings. The Sign Code ordinance was proposed to promote economic development, help businesses communicate their services more effectively, and to assist the City, schools and churches in keeping the community better informed. The changes resulted from a 9-month effort by the Council's Finance and Economic Development Committee working with property owners, businesses and developers to improve the City's economy.

"I am delighted that the City Council adopted these changes. This is one of three significant economic development-related municipal code changes made in 2013" said Mayor Pro-Tem Matt Pina, Chair of the Finance and Economic Development

Committee. Public hearings for changes to the City's Pacific Ridge Zone and Parking regulations were held on August 8th and adopted on September 12th. "Together these changes should make it much easier for existing business to grow and for new businesses to develop" he added.

A key change to the Sign Code included provisions for City-operated 32 square foot reader board signs communicating information about City services, community events and emergency management. The first such reader board sign will be installed later this year in conjunction with the Transportation Gateway improvement on South 216th Street at the entrance to the Des Moines Activity Center and financed in large part by private funds.

centers will also be allowed to install freestanding signs up to 10 feet tall, 80 square feet in area, including up to 32 square feet for electronic reader board signs.

Other changes included:

- Increasing the size of business identification signs from 4 to 36 square feet.
- Doubling the size of on-premises bulletin boards to 24 square feet.
- Allowing a single 12 square foot off premises sign when none was previously permitted.
- Permitting roof signs under certain height conditions for Pacific Ridge businesses.
- Increasing the area size for freestanding signs from 80 to 100 square feet.
- Increasing the height for free standing signs from 15 to 20 feet, with administrative flexibility for the City Manager to approve taller signs under certain site conditions.
- Eliminating the general prohibition for off premises signs.
- Doubling the size of single business property wall signs - increasing the maximum size from 100 to 200 square feet depending on the length of street frontage.
- Eliminating technical provisions which will allow internally illuminated signs to be more easily seen at night.
- Allowing realtors to have more directional signs in place longer on the days of their open houses.

Commercial and Multi-family Property Clean up

IN RESPONSE TO COMPLAINTS FROM LOCAL BUSINESS OWNERS AND CITIZENS, the City Council passed Ordinance 13-105 adopting a section of the International Property Maintenance Code pertaining to the outside appearance of commercial and multifamily property.

As part of the City's emphasis on economic development, Code Enforcement will be using this new tool along with existing city code to conduct a proactive emphasis in the Marina District and along the Pacific Highway corridor to encourage improvements to the commercial and multi-family properties in these areas.

Below is a list of the code compliance issues we have asked our code enforcement

officer to pay particular attention to: **Outside Appearance** – The newly adopted portion of the code requires the exterior of the building be properly maintained. This includes:

- A visible address
- All non- decay resistant wood and metal that is subject to rust be painted

• No peeling paint or oxidation stains **Garbage** – Commercial and multi-family properties must have garbage service. Per the code, garbage should be inside an enclosure and the container must have a lid **Landscaping** – The code requires the landscaping be maintained, not blocking the sidewalk or right of way and that weeds be no higher than 12 inches. Signage – We will be checking for abandoned signs and to assure that banners have the appropriate permits. (Banner permits are issued at no cost). Parking Lot Usage – Junk vehicles and recreational vehicles cannot be stored on commercial properties, nor may the business allow more vehicles than the allotted parking space. In addition to those listed above, each business must have a valid City of Des Moines Business License. Questions about business licenses can be directed to 206-870-6535. Fines for the violations vary, but can be up to \$513.00 per violation.

Puget Sound Starts Here!

AS WE ALL KNOW, SUMMER IS GONE AND RAIN HAS RETURNED. Rain is part of our life in the Pacific Northwest. Stormwater runoff is rain or snowmelt that flows from pavement areas, rooftops, and lawns into the nearest stream, creek, catch basin, or directly to Puget Sound, mostly without any treatment. Stormwater runoff poses a high risk to Puget Sound because it can transport everything in its way, such as petroleum products, pesticides, animal waste, and construction runoff. These materials contribute to algae blooms, habitat degradation, and decreased water quality.

The City of Des Moines has joined with the Puget Sound Starts Here Statewide Campaign to keep pollutants out of our waterways. Everyone can help by adopting these simple habits into their daily life:

- Use moderate fertilizer on your lawn.
- Make sure all garbage is placed into lidded containers and protected from rainfall.
- Scoop up after your pet.
- Recycle your yard waste and do not dump yard debris or grass clippings near streams.
- Report any spills, water discoloration, or water sheen.

Bow Lake Recycling And Transfer Station Reopens For Recycling

King County has completed the construction of a new facility at the Bow Lake **Recycling and Transfer** Station, located at 18800 **Orlilla Road South in Tukwila,** lust northeast of Des Molnes. While garbage was still accepted during construction, recycling services were suspended or limited starting in 2009. A grand opening ceremony was held on **October 8th with King County Executive Dow Constantine** on hand to rededicate the facility. The new facility is projected to receive a Goldlevel certification through the Leadership in Energy and **Environmental Design (LEED)** rating system.

Club KHAOS tackles childhood obesity

ACCORDING TO THE CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL, approximately 17% (or 12.5 million) of children and adolescents aged 2-19 years are obese. The City of Des Moines Recreation Department is stepping up to the plate and piloting a new physical fitness program called K-FIT, currently being implemented at Club KHAOS (Kids Having an Outrageous School Year) before and after school programs.

Through a Communities Putting Prevention to Work (CPPW) grant received in the spring of 2013, Sue Anderson and our department have been working to put a stop to childhood obesity. This year,

the City of Des Moines Recreation Department is working to show children how play improves their fitness and why it is so important through the FAB 5.

A program developed by Focused Fitness, FAB 5 is a cousin program to Five for Life, a new physical education curriculum to be implemented by the Highline School District in the fall of 2014. With the FAB 5 characters, Cardio Kid (cardio respiratory endurance), BC (body composition), Max (muscular strength), Maddy (muscular endurance), and Flexy (flexibility), children can connect the dots and see how activity contributes to these five key components.

CLUB KHAOS participants at local elementary schools play games where every child is engaged, moving, and learning about health components. While attending Des Moines Elementary during a K-FIT game called Risk Factor 4 Square, children were quizzed about different risk factors for health. During a pause, one team (chosen based on who had a particular numbered ball) was asked a question drawn from a hat. "Poor nutrition is a risk factor because?" asked our Recreation Leader Brittany Liebhart. After huddling with team #2, the children confidently responded with, "It is bad for your heart and you will become obese."

Hearing the children verbalize the vocabulary in the curriculum is a demonstration of its ability to get kids on board with ideas of what health is and how it

fits in to their life. After interviewing a handful of other kids

in our program, here is what they had to say about it:

"You learn about not smoking and it can give you cancer and affects your breathing."

"You get sweaty."

"I like learning new games."

"I like throwing balls to get more energy."

We are really excited about this new program and aim to set the physical fitness activity standard for our state. Physical activity matters because it prevents diseases like obesity, heart disease, diabetes, and some cancers. It also helps children learn! We are changing the culture of fitness with children by showing them exactly how developing healthy habits now will allow them to be successful throughout life.

If you are interested in finding out how your child can get in on K-FIT fun, please call Cassie Swan, at 206-870-6582. Programs run from school dismissal to 6pm with K-FIT taking place at 5pm. Parents can run errands while children are burning off pent up energy. It is so much fun; kids often don't want to leave!

REUSE OR FLATTEN. Save your best cardboard boxes to use again. For boxes headed to the recycling cart, flatten them first to make room for other recyclables. DON'T WORRY ABOUT WINDOWS OR TAPE.

Envelopes with transparent windows can still be recycled, as can paper with staples or a little bit of tape.

KNOW WHERE TO GO. A few types of paper – including shredded paper, pizza boxes and other food-soiled paper such as napkIns and dirty paper plates – don't go in your recycling cart. Put those in your food and yard waste cart for composting. INCLUDE CARTONS AND CUPS. Empty mllk and soy

FROM THE CHIEF'S DESK



AT THE SEPTEMBER 26TH CITY COUNCIL MEETING, I spoke to Council and our Community about how the Des Moines Police Department collects crime statistics. Until April 2012,

we reported our crime stats to the FBI using the standard known as the Uniform Crime Report or UCR. The UCR is also known as the Summary Report and was developed and implemented by the FBI in the 1930's.

It was created to provide a consistent reporting standard, so that reliable crime information could be collected and published.

The UCR collects data in 8 crime categories: homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, auto theft, and arson. These crimes make up what the UCR refers to as the Part One crimes. The UCR only reports one crime per incident. For example, if someone breaks into a home, then commits an assault and a homicide, only the most serious of the crimes committed would be reported. The method of determining the reported crime is based on the UCR Hierarchy Rule. This

In January of 2012, the UCR was replaced by The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS), NIBRS collects data on 49 criminal offenses and arrest data on an additional 10 criminal offenses. NIBRS also collects data on: crime victims. offenders, relationships between parties involved, location and time, weapon use, drug or alcohol use, gang involvement, attempted crimes, and clearance of crimes reported. This data was not previously collected or reported under the UCR method. NIBRS tracks and reports on up to 10 crimes per incident. Taking the earlier example used of someone breaking into a home; all offenses committed would now be reported. NIBRS doesn't follow


The Des Moines Police Department has a new 10-digit phone number to call when reporting "non-emergency" and not "in progress" type incidents. For these less critical incidents, please call: 206-878-2121. By using the new non-emergency number, the public is ensuring that 911 will be readily available for actual emergencies. Non-emergencies could include reporting a crime that occurred prior and there is no suspect information, animal complaints where the animal is nonaggressive, and situations where emergency services personnel are needed, but there is no danger or life threatening circumstance occurring at the time.

Dial 9-1-1 when a serious medical emergency, any type of fire, a crime in-progress, any suspicious activity, any dangerous and/or life threatening emergency, and any time a person fears for their safety or the safety of others.

If you are not sure if your situation is an emergency, you are encouraged to call 9-1-1.

Some reports, such as lost property, abandoned vehicles, theft and vandalism under \$1,500, and non-injury hit-and-run accidents that occurred in Des Moines, can be made online on the City of Des Moines website at www.desmoineswa. gov by going to "How Do I ...?" "Report a..." "Crime Online".



s 2013 draws to a close, the terms of service for two of our founding Des Moines Pool Metropolitan Park District commissioners comes to a close.

extraordinary contributions to the creation of the new district and to the preservation of the Mount Rainier Pool. We will greatly miss their dedication to sustaining swimming in our community.

When the district was first created by the voters of Des Moines in November 2009, Marty quickly accepted the role as president of our fledgling commission and led us through the arduous task of not only creating a municipal entity where none existed, but utilized his skills as a former facilities manager for Boeing to help us make repairs and cost-saving improvements to the now 39-year-old Mount Rainier Pool.



Resident Priority: Effective January 1, 2010, the City of Des Moines implemented a Resident Discount Policy offering residents discounted fees for recreation programs. Non-residents and city residents who choose not to provide proof of residency will be assessed the full fee for programs.




