



A LOOK BACK

DES MOINES SCHOOL WAS BUILT IN 1897 on the site where Des Moines Elementary school stands today. Primary students were housed in the basement rooms, intermediate students on the first floor and high school students in the two rooms on the top floor.

The High School offered two areas of study: a classical course and a commercial or business course. The classical course required four years of English and Latin; one and a half years each of Algebra and Geometry; and one year each, of Physical Geography, Ancient History, Medieval and Modern History, American History and Civics, and Physics.

The first graduation was in 1910. The ceremony was held in "Daddy" Draper's "Oprey House" and all the 200 residents of the town appeared to be there.

The entire school was destroyed by fire on January 9, 1925. Townfolk scurried to install partitions and chalk boards, desks and books in the IOOF Hall, and school resumed the following Monday morning. Later that year construction began on the first four rooms of the brick Des Moines Elementary school Building, which continue to serve our children today.

Rilda Martin is undoubtedly in the attached 1909 photo, she was president of the 1911 graduating class, and married Otto Moses in 1918. As "Mrs. Moses" she taught Kindergarten in Des Moines from 1947 until she retired in April 1966, having taught over 1,200 Des Moines children.

State Funds Awarded to Rehabilitate the Des Moines Beach Park's Historic Dining Hall

BREAKING NEWS! On June 30, 2013 Governor Inslee signed the 2013-2015 state budget which authorized the re-appropriation of \$128,062 of funding for Heritage Capital Projects grant contracts which had not been completed, as well as the award of \$850,000 of additional Heritage Capital Projects grant funds for the long

awaited rehabilitation and reopening of the Beach Park Dining Hall.

The City anticipates that the Dining Hall will reopen in 2014, adding another unique venue to the Beach Park for family gatherings, community festivals, weddings and receptions; non-profit & service club events; corporate meetings and trade shows; and performing, visual arts and heritage activities.

If you have visited the Des
Moines Beach Park Historic District
recently, you will notice that there
have been many improvements made
to the historic buildings including
the rehabilitation of the 6,000 sq. ft.
Auditorium, the lifting of the Dining
Hall above the Des Moines Creek, new
decking and landscaping and interior
updates to the Founders Lodge. These
improved buildings along with the
recent renovations at the Des Moines
Marina create a one of a kind waterfront
event center.

The Beach Park and Marina resources provide access for our citizens and visitors of more than a half mile of public waterfront. The combined facilities include waterborne, upland, indoor and outdoor spaces and parking to serve as an event venue for activities drawing crowds of up to 5,000 to enhance the City's downtown Marina District identity as a destination, to improve economic opportunities for local business and services, and to provide sustainable income to maintain

these much loved waterfront resources.

The Beach Park Historic District, formerly known as Covenant Beach Bible Camp, was acquired by the City in the late 1980s. Its distinction as the only remaining Swedish church camp built in the early 1900's to 1960's located on waterfront in the Puget Sound region,

qualified this heritage resource to be listed on the Washington and National Historic Registers. Included within the District are eight extant historic buildings (Auditorium, Dining Hall, Picnic Shelter, Sun Home Lodge, Restroom, two Cabins and one Cottage) and non-contributing buildings (Founders Lodge and one Caretakers Cabin) which are located between the pedestrian bridge at the front of the park and the turn-around at the back

parking lot.

Des Moines Transportation Gateway Project

HAVE YOU TRAVELED BY THE DES MOINES POST OFFICE LATELY and noticed the initial segment of the Transportation Gateway Project under construction? Virtually every citizen in the City has been impacted by the widening of the heavily traveled S 216th Street corridor between 24th Avenue S and 18th Avenue S. Construction is well underway and when finished will include an additional travel lane, new traffic signals, bicycle lanes, bus stop improvements, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, underground utilities, pedestrian and street lighting, landscaping and a large drainage retention pond. Subject to weather, this segment could be completed up to 3 months ahead of schedule or by November, 2013.

Construction to widen 24th Avenue South (between S. 216th Street and S. 208th Street) began this Spring with utility relocation. Early next fall the City plans to begin roadway construction, utility undergrounding and water main replacement. Associated traffic disruptions will continue for about 2 years. These corridor improvements are focused on heavier vehicle movements, as well as sidewalks with planter strips and bicycle facilities that will support pending Des Moines Creek Business Park development by the Port of Seattle (see associated article in this issue) and other anticipated development. Meanwhile,

the City of SeaTac is progressing with design and funding to connect 24th/28th Avenue South (between S 208th Street and S 200th Street) easing connections to the new S 200th Street light rail station being constructed by Sound Transit (2016 planned opening.)

Design and right of way planning has been finalized for the S 216th Street corridor between 29th Avenue S and the Pacific Highway South intersection. The City is now seeking funds for right-of-way acquisition and construction.

Funding for these improvements are from the Federal Highways Administration,

the Washington State Transportation Improvement Board, Highline Water District, Midway Sewer District, King County Metro and the City of Des Moines. Private developers and the Port of Seattle are making very substantial contributions towards the frontage improvements.

Thank you very much for your patience and caution, protecting construction workers and pedestrians, while construction is underway. Developer for 87 Acre Des Moines Creek Business Park Selected-Projected to Create 1,000 Permanent Jobs

The Port of Seattle has selected a developer for the Des Moines Creek Business Park project, Panattoni Development Company, Inc., a privately-held real estate development firm headquartered in Newport Beach, California. The firm was chosen from a field of four proposers to develop approximately 87 acres of property south of Seattle-Tacoma International Airport with a combination of airport-


related commercial and light industrial uses.

"I am delighted that Panattoni has been selected from a very competitive list of national real estate development firms to develop the Des Moines Creek Business Park beginning next year" said Mayor Dave Kaplan. "We are pleased that they have a strong local office, that their team will be local planners, engineers and contractors, and that they have a great reputation

working with their host cities. This is the most important single economic development project in the City's 55-year history, and the City pledges to do everything within its power to make this a wonderful community-defining, commercially successful project."

Panattoni's preliminary development budget for the Class A business park project is estimated at \$100-125 million. The development will include up to two million square feet of flexible-use, manufacturing, office, distribution and industrial business park buildings able to accommodate tenants that desire immediate proximity to Sea-Tac Airport for their business (such as freight, avionics manufacturers, air cargo company offices, etc.).

The build-out of the project is expected to be in several phases over 7 years, with ground breaking for the first phase as soon as the summer of 2014.

Artemis Hotel Project Receives Funding Approval

The Yareton Group and the City of Des Moines are pleased to announce that the application for "EB-5" foreign investor visa program funding has been approved by the federal government, after a two-year processing delay. The new EB-5 Regional Center Designation, which covers the greater Des Moines area, opens the door for foreign investors to create hundreds of jobs and fuel the local economy with new development projects.



"This is the beginning of great things for our Pacific Ridge neighborhood," said Des Moines Mayor Dave Kaplan, who was an early supporter of the project.

"The City of Des Moines has been a wonderful partner in moving this project forward," said Albert Sze, Yareton Group Project Director. "We look forward to a quality development that will benefit both investors and the region."

Hotel plans include an authentic four-star Chinese restaurant of a quality and authenticity currently unavailable in the Puget Sound region, as well as an upscale spa and other high-end amenities. A partnership with a top hotel chain is being discussed, as well as the inclusion of a casino that would create approximately 100 additional jobs.

Sound Transit Light Rail Through Des Moines

In June 2012, Sound Transit began an "Alternatives Analysis" on the 7.6 mile corridor from South 200th Street to the Federal Way Transit Center including stations in the vicinity of Highline Community College by 2023 and South 272nd Street when funds become available. The Alternatives Analysis is now complete.

Sound Transit staff and their consultants evaluated a range of alternative alignments on SR99, I-5, 30th Avenue South and 24th Avenue South including plans for elevated, at grade and mixed cross sections, and 22 possible station locations including at South 216th Street, between Kent-Des Moines Road and South 240th, near South 260th, and in Redondo. The purpose of this evaluation was to assess degrees of relative impact indicating which alignments and station locations should be further evaluated during the EIS process.

The Des Moines City Council working with their SeaTac City Council counterparts established the following seven prioritized goals for Light Rail Extension to guide alternative analysis and decision making on light rail extension and station locations through our respective cities:

- 1. Minimize impacts on businesses and residents
- 2. Facilitate, not compromise, economic development along alignment3. Maintain traffic capacity along

SR99 and at Kent-Des Moines inter-

4. Be compatible with full build out of SR509 extension to I-5 and collector distributor network to Federal Way 5. Facilitate Highline Community College access and fully mitigate traffic, parking, land use and law enforcement impacts on the College

6. Facilitate *Transit Oriented Development* along alignment and especially at stops

7. Improve local east-west and northsouth transit connections as well as regional commuting

Sound Transit's Board will review EIS scoping comments and approve Draft EIS alternatives on September 26, 2013. Completion of the environmental approval process and a Sound Transit Board decision on what to build is expected in late 2016 based on available funds followed by a Record of Decision from the Federal Transit Administration.

LED Streetlight Conversion Project

54Watt

Over the next three years the City will be converting 1,021 streetlights to a more energy efficient alternative. The conversion will remove the current 100Watt High Pressure Sodium (HPS) streetlights and replace them with 54Watt LED lights. Even though the LED fixtures are lower wattage, the light levels produced are very similar. However, you may notice that the light from new



LED streetlights will appear more like "daylight" and "whiter" in light color, as compared to a more "yellow" color from the current street lights.

Converting streetlights from HPS to LED is a step toward reducing the City's ongoing costs associated with street lights. Last year the City spent approximately 30% of the total Street Fund Budget on streetlight maintenance and electricity. These new streetlights use about 50% less electricity and last nearly 20 years as compared to the 8 year life of a HPS fixture. The current monthly cost for each HPS light is \$12.02 per month, as compared to \$8.38 per month for a 54Watt LED fixture - a savings of approximately 30%. This conversion project will result in an annual savings of about \$45,253 per year.

PSE crews started the project in July, and will be working essentially from the north end of the City to the south.



New Flashing Beacons For North Hill Elementary

The City of Des Moines is planning to install School Zone Flashing warning beacons along 8th Avenue South and South 200th Street this fall. These new lights will flash during the arrival and dismissal times of North Hill Elementary School. The City will be able to purchase and install these new flashing beacons in part from a \$15,000 grant by the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission. These particular lights are solar powered and are the second of this kind of installation for the City. Staff hopes to begin installation in September and complete the project in October. The rest of the funds for the beacons will come from the City's Traffic Safety Fund which is supported almost entirely by the Automated Speed Enforcement cameras near Midway and Woodmont Elementary Schools.

The flashing lights will be an additional reminder for vehicles to observe the 20 mph school zone speed limit. The City places a high value on the safety of school children and school zones and is looking forward to the positive effect the lights might have on vehicle speeds. As a part of the grant, the City will be doing an "after" study on speeds within the year to measure the effectiveness of these lights. The signs will also state that the 20 mph speed limit is in effect "When Flashing or When Children are Present", so even if the lights aren't flashing, the speed limit can be enforced at 20 mph when children are present.

PUBLIC WORKS AT THE MARKET

The Public Works Department of the City of Des Moines had equipment and staff at the market in June and July to talk with citizens and answer any question they might have regarding current and upcoming projects. It was a great opportunity to meet the folks you see out on the street or in the park working for you. The Surface Water Management team was there to talk about the exceedingly popular Pipe Program, Car Wash Kits and to answer any questions on water quality, flooding issues or storm water.

Our Transportation Engineers had examples of street lights, signs, pavement markers and Inventory systems and information regarding the ongoing street projects such as the large 216th Street/Gateway Project currently under construction. The Parks and Maintenance crew had various pieces of equipment there and explained how they worked and what they do to keep our City looking good. It was also a great opportunity for familles with kids to climb into the driver's seat and see how it would feel to operate a backhoe or dumptruck. The Administration staff was on hand to talk about the City's Public Works Department and explain what portion of your tax dollars go where. The trip to the market was the first of what may become an annual event for the City and citizens in our community.



SUMMER TIME AND WEST NILE VIRUS

West Nile virus was found for the first time in King County in 2006. Also in 2006, Washington State had its first human cases when West Nile virus fever was diagnosed in residents of Pierce County (2 cases) and Clark County (1 case). The year 2009 saw the most West Nile virus activity ever recorded in Washington State. That year there were 73 horses with confirmed disease and 38 human cases. One human case was reported in 2010 and none in 2011. To date, no human cases have been documented to have acquired WNv in King County.

In response to the effect of West Nile Virus (WNv) within our state, City staff began treating City-owned ponds with a larvicide to help in reducing the possibility of residents becoming infected. The City always encourages residents to inspect their property and eliminate potential breeding areas such as standing pools of water, old tires, buckets, disused swimming pools, etc. West

Nile virus infects humans, mosquitoes, horses, and other animals. Most of the time, infection with WNv makes people mildly ill. Symptoms include body aches, skin rashes and swollen glands. More severe infection can result in encephalitis, meaning severe headache, high fever, neck stiffness, disorientation, and sometime convulsions.

What Goes Where? Answering questions about recycling and composting

What do I do with THAT? Recycling cart? Yard waste cart? Garbage? Aiiieeeeee! Recycling and composting can be confusing. Here's what to do with common items found around the house.

GARBAGE

FOOD AND YARD WASTE

OTHER

FROM THE KITCHEN

Dirty paper towels if stained with cleaning chemicals or human/pet waste. Food and yard waste cart if they have food stains.

Take-out food containers if made from <u>coated</u> paper (shiny). Otherwise, they go in the in food waste cart. Unsure? Put them in the garbage.

FROM THE BATHROOM

Used facial tissues and other tissue from the bathroom.

"Flushable" items such as toilet bowl brush heads or cleaning wipes. Do not flush, they can clog pipes and septic tanks and create problems at the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

OTHER TRICKY WASTE

Pet waste. Always bagged or double-bagged). Never in the food and yard waste cart, even if it's in a biodegradable bag.

RECYCLE

FROM THE KITCHEN

Pizza boxes - if it's a frozen pizza box. Food and yard waste if it's a cardboard pizza delivery box.

Paper milk cartons. Recycling cart, but rinse them first.

Paper grocery bags. Recycling cart, if clean. Yard waste cart, if stained with food or filled with food scraps.

FROM THE BATHROOM

Cardboard cores from paper towels and toilet paper.

FROM THE KITCHEN

Dirty paper towels if they have food stains. Garbage if stained with cleaning chemicals or human/pet waste.

Take-out food containers if made from cardboard or uncoated paper (uncoated paper is not shiny). Otherwise, they go in the garbage cart. Unsure? Put them in the garbage.

Paper plates and cups if uncoated (not shiny). Unsure? Put them in the garbage.

Greasy pizza boxes if it's a cardboard pizza delivery box. Place in recycling cart if it's a frozen pizza box.

Meat, fish, poultry, bones, veggie and fruit trimmings and other food scraps.

Paper berry and egg cartons.

Paper grocery bags if stained with food or filled with food scraps.

OTHER TRICKY WASTE

Shredded paper. Food and yard waste cart. Layer it in with yard and food debris. Make sure it doesn't contain shredded plastic such as old credit cards.



FROM THE KITCHEN

Cooking oil and kitchen grease. Put in a clear plastic jug, label with your name and address, and place next to your recycling cart (or contact your property manager to arrange collection if you live in an apartment or condo). CleanScapes will collect a maximum of three gallons for free.

FROM THE BATHROOM

Unwanted medications, including pet meds. Take to an authorized pharmacy or other location (see www. takebackyourmeds.org or call (206) 263-3014). Don't flush or put these in the garbage.

"Flushable" items such as toilet bowl brush heads or cleaning wipes. Garbage. Don't flush, they can clog pipes and septic tanks and create problems at the Wastewater Treatment Plant.

OTHER

Motor oil. Put in a clear plastic jug, label with your name and address, and place next to your recycle cart (or contact your property manager to arrange collection if you live in an apartment or condo). CleanScapes will collect a maximum of three gallons for free.

Household batteries. Place button, alkaline, and rechargeable batteries in a Ziploc-style bag on top of recycling cart for free recycling (or contact your property manager to arrange collection if you live in an apartment or condo).

Fluorescent bulbs and tubes. Wrap tubes in newspaper and place next to recycle cart, place CFL bulbs in a Ziploc-style bag on top of recycling cart for free collection (or contact your property manager if you live in an apartment or condo).

Styrofoam blocks. Call CleanScapes at (206) 762-4900 to arrange free curbside collection (or contact your property manager if you live in an apartment or condo).



Housing Repair Assistance Program

The City of Des Moines is once again providing minor home repair services to City resident homeowners who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes based on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines. This is done by providing free repair services to improve the health and safety of our residents as they live in their homes.

SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE:

- Electrical faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans
- Plumbing -- faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters
- Disability Aids installation of grab bars, handrails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non-skid surfaces
- Safety installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms & locksets
- Other faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE ERFE SERVICES?

- 1. Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months and have proof of home owner's insurance
- 2. Complete the application process

Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. Services that are required for your health and/or safety are the highest priority.


