

Des Moines. The Fourth of July firework show was fantastic and the Waterland Festival and Parade really showed off the sense of community that exists in Des Moines. Without the countless volunteer hours and participation of so many of our great residents, these events wouldn't be possible. Please share your gratitude if you see any of them around the town, I know I will!

In the last City Currents column that I co-wrote with Deputy Mayor Vic Pennington, we highlighted the City's drastically improved financial condition. Our improved situation has allowed the City Council to authorize three new police officer positions, create a new Assistant

ief of Police position to help manage our new policing model, and add a new detective position to serve on the multi-jurisdictional violent crimes taskforce, formed to address crimes throughout South King County. I am happy to report that the department is actively hiring to fill these positions. We were able to allocate the additional funding to law enforcement because we were willing to make some very difficult decisions over the past few years.

There is no doubt that this region is in a period of unprecedented growth. To ensure we are able to take advantage of the economic development opportunities that are currently available, the city

Council has taken a hard look at the way that we do business in Des Moines. Through the improved use of technology, amendments to the city code, and with input from our excellent city staff, we have been able to streamline the permit process. This give us an advantage over the competition for development and redevelopment. (See article re Permitting Processes p. 10). The result is that we are seeing a number of large and small scale construction projects throughout the city that are bringing family wage jobs to Des Moines and further improving our financial sustainability.

Recently, the marina paid parking system went live. Although we have received some complaints about the paid parking program, people are already noticing the additional benefits of the new system. The gates help to enforce the nightly Marina closure that has always existed, but has not always been respected. As a result, law enforcement is no longer being rerouted from city wide calls to address noise and trespass complaints that used to occur in the Marina on a nightly basis. Staff is noting a dramatic reduction in waste and contraband cleanup. Walkers, joggers and tenants are also

telling us that the marina feels more safe and inviting. The main benefit is that the paid parking program is allowing the city to put aside funds for the much needed repair and replacement of the North Marina Bulkhead. Without this, the bulkhead will fail and a significant part of the marina will be lost for all. This has been accomplished with minimal parking rates set at \$1 per hour with a maximum all day charge of \$5. Yearly resident passes are available for the cost of processing and administration, at the Harbormaster's office. Please note that Anthony's Restaurant provides free parking validation to their customers and the Farmer's Market provides a two hour validation with a purchase from any market vendor.

As with everything, we are listening, learning and adjusting as we go. We are committed to a model of continuous improvement. Thank you for your participation, input, understanding and support.

As summer starts to fade away into fall, I hope you take time to enjoy the rest of what summer has to offer. Please be sure to check out all the wonderful things happening in this issue of the *City Currents*.





Recycle? Compost? Garbage? Oh, my.

DO YOU, TOO, STRUGGLE EACH TIME YOU THROW SOMETHING AWAY? Do you stare with frustration at the three-way instruction pamphlet, glancing back and forth between the cute little pictures and what you hold in your hand? Which bin *does* this go into? And why should I care? Why should I get it right? Can't I just throw it in the garbage and let someone else deal with it?

Children ask why all the time, and so should we. Once we understand, we're more likely to follow direction. I called a Recology expert to answer a few common questions.

Why recycle and compost in the first place?

Recycling converts used products into new; it reduces the need to extract virgin materials and reduces the amount in landfills. Landfills are a finite resource and land is expensive. Garbage in a landfill breaks down and releases greenhouse gas methane, one of the gases contributing to a blanket around our atmosphere known as global warming. Composting keeps scraps out of the landfill and reduces methane. Compost is nutrient rich and can be reused locally.

Where does it go?

Recyclables are sorted locally. It must meet the specs, have enough volume of material, and is then sold at market value nationally or beyond. Compost is kept locally at composting facilities. Garbage goes into local landfills, but they will eventually meet capacity and will need to be transported further, resulting in higher costs to the consumer.

What are the biggies?

- Glass. It doesn't lose its strength and is infinitely recyclable.
- Paper. The fibers in paper become shorter and weaker each time it is recycled (up to ten times). Clean paper can be recycled; food soiled paper goes in the composter.
- Metals. Recycle aluminum, metals with iron, steel and some others. Empty aerosol canisters can be recycled.
- Plastics are varied and their recyclability depends on how they were manufactured. Ignore the chasing arrows with the numbers. Instead ask, "Is this a tub, jug or bottle?" If so, like 90% of plastics, it can be recycled. Note, only tan meat trays are compostable; Styrofoam is not.

Remember, plastics need to be free from food waste and dry, which is why ziplocks or other dirty plastics are not allowed. Food contaminates the batch and will be refused by market. Lids need to be attached to bottles, or placed in the garbage if under three inches due to sorting techniques. Smaller plastics fall through the separating screens and contaminate the batch of glass or other product below.

Why bag the plastic bags?

Imagine being a sorter at the front line of a giant conveyor belt whose job is to pull off any oversized items or those that interfere with the purity of the materials or the equipment's operation. One of these culprits is loose plastics. The sorters have to easily grab the bags of plastic (grocer bags, clear and clean film) and separate them for further processing. Let's make their job easier.

Now you have more information about why and how we recycle and compost. The folks at Recology say residents are doing good. Near 95% of recyclables received at the facilities are used. Still, almost 50% of garbage in the landfill could be composted or recycled. The Seattle region is fortunate to have curbside recycling and composting, still unavailable to much of the nation. Let's all become "Superstar Recyclers," and do our part in caring for our community and our environment.

The City of Des Moines Senior Services Advisory Committee has been working for over ten years to help bring safe medicine disposal sites to King County and Des Moines. The years of hard work have paid off; as there is now a safe and convenient way to dispose of unused, expired, and leftover medications.

A new initiative, the King County
Secure Medication Program, aims to
provide a safe, convenient, and responsible
means of disposing of prescription and
over the counter medications. You can
now safely dispose of the medicines
you no longer need by taking them to a
convenient drop-box in the area. These
participating pharmacies, clinics, hospitals
and law enforcement offices will accept
vost prescription and over-the-counter
medicines for disposal at no cost.

CONGRATULATIONS TO LAURA HARTEMA. She has been chosen by the Des Moines Legacy Foundation board of directors to receive the foundation's inaugural LEGACY Award. The award is in the form of a glass flame, signifying the positive force of an outstanding community volunteer in changing the needs of our community through selfless leadership through parks, recreation and senior services.

Laura has been the director of Friends of Des Moines Creek for nearly two decades. Her focus has been on protecting the stream buffer, removing invasives and replanting with native plants to reduce erosion, protect trees from English ivy, and improve fish and wildlife habitat.

Laura, a vivacious woman, was surprised by the award. "Being a local ecologist, I enjoy the many volunteers who pitch in to improve our community and Des Moines Creek. All types of groups have volunteered, from high schools, colleges, churches, and other community groups. It is a tough task to control invasive, non-invasive vegetation along the creek and maintain a healthy buffer. Native plants help prevent erosion, improve water quality, and provide shade and cover for salmon."

Laura maintains a volunteer website and has contributed various Ask an Ecologist articles for the Des Moines City Currents magazine for the past two years. I asked Laura what she wanted to convey to the community about preserving the environment; "I write

What is a Nuisance?

A nuisance involves an unreasonable or unlawful use of property that results in material annoyance, inconvenience, discomfort, or damage to another person or to the public. Common nuisances include accumulation of junk, garbage, excessive noise, dangerous buildings, unsanitary conditions or overgrown weeds/vegetation.

What is being done about it?

The City Council has adopted both as a short term and long term strategic objective the aggressive remediation of nuisance properties. This has resulted in the creation of a code enforcement team and increased collaboration across all city departments to efficiently and effectively address problem properties.



Report potential nuisance properties through the city website—www.desmoineswa.gov

All complaints are investigated with health and safety issues given top priority. If a nuisance is found, the property owner is generally given an opportunity to correct the problem before additional action is taken by the City. Recent enforcement action taken by the city includes issuing fines, clearing property, and demolishing abandoned structures.

Construction of Parkside Park Improvements Begins in August

PARKSIDE PARK, TRANSFERRED FROM KING COUNTY TO THE CITY OF DES MOINES IN 1993, is long overdue for needed updates. Although the park is in a beautiful hillside setting, it requires vegetation and amenity improvements to make the park safer, user friendly and accessible to the surrounding neighborhood.

The City's Parks, Recreation and Senior Services Master Plan identified that the park's entryways are in poor condition and e not ADA accessible. Much of the park is vergrown with blackberry bushes, dense brush, and unhealthy trees that need to be addressed to enhance site safety. The fencing around the park perimeter needs repair or replacement in some areas for site security. Hillside re-grading is needed to create accessible pathways to an open play area. The existing sport court, play equipment and other amenities are in poor condition or have been removed and need to be replaced. This project will make those improvements as well as add


Place and install a new outdoor fitness area to create a welcoming neighborhood gathering place.

Parkside Park is an important community asset as the only developed park located in the South Des Moines neighborhood serving 5,000 citizens, located one block south of Highline College and in the new Transit Community Land Use Planning Area.

Funding for the park improvements is coming from the King County Community Development Block Grant program and the King County Youth Sports Facilities Grant Fund. The removal and replacement of contaminated soil in the park where the levels of arsenic exceed the established safety levels will be included in the project and funded by the Department of Ecology Soil Safety Program. Thinking of a New Puppy? Tips for Success

ARE YOU THINKING OF GETTING A NEW BABY PUPPY TO ADD TO YOUR FAMILY? Good for you! Puppies are wonderful—they are so much fun, but also so much work! Please consider how much time, effort, and money are involved before taking the plunge—and remember that pets are a lifetime commitment! Here are some tips that will help you with your new family addition:

"Quick Glance" New Puppy Checklist

- Have your home and yard "puppy proofed"
- use puppy's kennel crate for sleeping, and any time you need to safely confine him/her for a short period
- Take puppy outside for potty breaks immediately upon waking, right after eating, after short playtimes, plus every half-hour or so during the day—keep an eye on puppy at all times to watch for potty behaviors!
- Take puppy to your vet for proactive health care, such as examinations, vaccinations, and parasite control
- Feed puppy quality, premium food three times a day, and have fresh water available at all times
- Have puppy meet (at least!) 100 different people and 100 other dogs in the first 100 days you have him/her
- Handle and touch all over puppy's body, including mouth and paws daily, using petting, stroking, a happy voice, and food treats

- Teach puppy "No Bite" by giving the command and a mild scruff/collar check, then praise immediately when puppy stops biting and settles and/or distracts
- Keep a collar and tag on puppy at all times, and also have puppy micro-chipped—make sure to keep all info current
- Have puppy sit-stay before you feed him/her
- Groom puppy at least once a week
- Give puppy lots of safe toys and chewies
- Keep puppy on leash when not in confined area
- Take puppy to a group class as soon as possible for socialization, good manners, and basic training
- Never leave small children unattended with puppy
- Give puppy lots of exercise and play ("a tired dog is a good dog") and let puppy sleep as much as he/she wants to
- Take puppy with you as much as possible and everywhere possible (that is safe)
- And, have lots of FUN with puppy!





Marine View Drive/S. 240th Street—All Way Stop

ON JULY 18TH AT APPROXIMATELY 5:00 P.M., THE CITY IMPLEMENTED AN ALL WAY STOP at the intersection of Marine View Drive & South 240th Street. The improvement focuses on intersection safety to reduce vehicle speeds, vehicles leaving the roadway, and vehicle turning movement collisions while at the same time allowing for better pedestrian access. Long term, the city is looking at the feasibility to install a roundabout or traffic signal at this location.

24th/28th Connection— Transportation Gateway Project

24TH AND 28TH AVENUE S, BETWEEN S 216TH STREET AND S 200TH STREET IS NOW CONNECTED as part of a major collaborative effort between the City of Des Moines and the City of SeaTac. This roadway opens direct access to the Angle Lake Light Rail station at S 200th Street and continues north to SeaTac Airport. The roadway includes a bridge over the future extension of SR509 with a connection to I-5.

Widening of S 216th Street between 24th Avenue S and Pacific Highway S was completed last year by the City of Des Moines as part of the Transportation Gateway Project. The combined improvements provide a multi-modal corridor, serving freight, automobiles, transit, bicycles and pedestrians along these principal arterials. The improvements provide extra vehicular capacity, helping to solidify economic development in north-central Des Moines. This area is rapidly being converted from an underutilized residential/commercial neighborhood, impacted by aircraft noise, to a robust business park community that is estimated to employ at least 2,100 people, including the FAA, by 2018.

The last link to the Des Moines Marina District will widen S 216th Street between 11th Avenue S and 20th Avenue S will include a left turn lane, bicycle lanes, sidewalks, underground utilities, and other improvements characteristic of the Transportation Gateway Project. Funded in part by the Transportation Improvement Board, this last egment is scheduled for construction in 2019.

Other related initiatives being pursued by the city includes a King County Metro Transit pilot project providing "community connections" between the Marina District, the Des Moines Creek Business Park and the Angle Lake Station by late 2017.

Community Connections Pilot Project

THE CITY OF DES MOINES
SUCCESSFULLY COMPETED AND WAS
SELECTED BY KING COUNTY METRO
to develop a Transit Community
Connections Pilot Project that would
fill a public transportation corridor
gap between the Des Moines Marina
District and the Angle Lake Light
Rail Station. Identified was the need
to link the rapidly emerging Des
Moines Creek Business Park (DMCBP)
employment site on 24th Avenue S,
Wesley Homes, and the businesses in
the Marina District.

The city formed a stakeholders' group of about 30 citizens and employers who surveyed mobility needs in the corridor. Included are representatives from large employers, the City of Normandy Park and the City of SeaTac.

Key mobility objectives are to:

- 1. Provide community connections to regional transit system
- 2. Provide options for those who do not or will not use cars
- 3. Provide flexible and safe options for employees who work off hours
- 4. Get around during work day without own car

Service options are being evaluated and a preferred plan is under development. There are a significant number of production and service employees who travel outside of "normal" peak work hours.

The group plans to work with Metro to have service implemented in the last quarter of 2017 in time to meet the influx of 1,600 FAA employees who are scheduled to arrive at the DMCBP site early in 2018. It is anticipated that the City Council will be asked to endorse the plan including an ongoing evaluation process to actively refine the service and respond to unmet mobility needs.

Housing Repair Assistance Program

THE CITY OF DES MOINES IS ONCE
AGAIN PROVIDING MINOR HOME REPAIR
SERVICES to city resident homeowners
who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes
based on U.S. Department of Housing
and Urban Development (HUD) income
guidelines. This is done by providing free
repair services to improve the health
and safety of our residents as they live in
their homes. Funding for this program is
provided by a Community Development
Block Grant through King County.

Services provided include but are not limited to:

Electrical – faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans

Plumbing – faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters

Disability Aids – installation of grab bars, hand rails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non skid surfaces



Safety – installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms and locksets

Other – faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE FREE SERVICES?

- Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months, have proof of home owner's insurance, and meet the HUD income guidelines for the program.
- 2. Complete the application process

HOW DO I APPLY?

To apply for this program please follow these directions:

- 1. Request an application by calling 206-870-6535
- 2. Complete the application forms and return them with the supporting documentation to the City of Des Moines/Minor Home Repair at: 21630 11th Ave. S. Ste. D, Des Moines WA 98198
- 3. Once your application is processed and evaluated you will receive a phone call informing you of your acceptance or non-eligibility for our program. Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. Services that are required for your health and/or safety are the highest priority.

Septic System Care

Household Practices

Keep solids, toxics, oils and grease out of the drain

- × Fats, oils, grease
- Harsh chemicals or cleaners, liquid drain de-cloggers, paint thinner, excessive bleach
- Exceeding the label's recommended amount of detergent
- Bath oils, excessive soaps

- × Old Medications
- Kitchen scraps, coffee grinds, avoid garbage disposal use
- ★ Floss, hair, feminine products, condoms, kitty litter
- Baby wipes, tissue, paper towels, excessive toilet paper

Reduce and control water usage

- Space loads of laundry throughout the week
- Fix leaking sinks and toilets
- Use high-efficiency washers, low-flow toilets and showerheads if possible
- Don't drain hot tubs into septic tank or onto the drainfield

The Septic Tank

Perform tank pumping and maintenance

- ✓ Have a state-licensed or Health District-certified service provider inspect your tank at least every three years some systems require more frequent inspection
- ✓ Learn your system type and maintenance schedule
- Have your system pumped approximately every three years based on your inspector's recommendation
- Clean outlet screen yearly (if your tank has one)
- Keep inspection and maintenance records
- Additives to "boost function" are not recommended

The Drainfield

Protect your drainfield and reserve areas

- No structures, parking, livestock, roof drainage or runoff near the drainfield
- No irrigation or sprinkler systems near the drainfield
- ✓ Plant only grass or shallow-rooted plants
- Contact your local health department or health district for a map of your drainfield

Regularly inspect your drainfield

- Check for odors, wet spots, or surfacing sewage
- If your drainfield has monitoring ports, check them every few weeks; ports that continually contain over six inches of water could indicate a problem


First off, the Mount Rainier Pool will be closed through September 17 for scheduled maintenance. We look forward to seeing everyone in the fall with extended hours and programming.

Resident Priority:

Effective January 1, 2010, the City of Des Moines implemented a Resident Discount Policy offering residents discounted fees for recreation programs. Non-residents and city residents who choose not




