

you to our leadership team. I hope you say "hello" to them when you see them out and about in our City. We are very fortunate to have such a talented team of dedicated


individuals to help us as we head into our very bright future.



Progress Report for the Shoreline Master Program Periodic Review


The City of Des Moines is in the process of reviewing its Shoreline Master Program (SMP), and is encouraging anyone that is interested to participate in the process. The first of two open houses was held on August 14, where participants were involved with visioning and identification of high-priority issues that will inform development of an amended SMP. In the coming months, proposed amendments to the SMP will be drafted. A second open house is scheduled to be held on the evening of Tuesday, November 13 at the Des Moines Activity Center, where participants will have the opportunity to weigh in on these draft changes. The City will also have a booth at the Des Moines Waterfront Farmers Market on Saturday August 25, from 10am-2pm.

WHAT IS THE SHORELINE MASTER PROGRAM PERIODIC REVIEW?

The City's SMP is the document that plans for and protects the City's horelines. The City's first SMP was opted in 1972 after the Shoreline Management Act (SMA) went into effect in 1971. Since then, the City has updated its SMP several times, leading to the current version that was approved by the Washington State Department of Ecology and adopted in 2011. The document provides the policies and regulations for how the City's shoreline areas are protected and for how they will be used and developed over time. The SMP applies to development within 200 feet of the Ordinary High Water Mark (OHWM), which in the City of Des Moines would include approximately 115 acres of property bordering the Puget Sound.

Every eight years, State law requires that the City conduct a periodic review of the SMP. The City has a deadline of June 30, 2019 to complete it during this periodic review cycle. The review ensures that the SMP stays current with changes in laws and rules, remains consistent with other Des Moines plans and regulations, and is responsive to changed circumstances, new information, and improved data. As part of this update, the City also plans to simplify shoreline permitting procedures.

Public participation is highly encouraged throughout the SMP update process. All interested parties are invited and encouraged to attend the open house on November 13 and the Farmers Market booth on August 25 to learn more about the SMP update and to contribute to its development. 

The warm summer sun is fading, and the cloudy days and cooler nights of autumn are on their way. As much fun as the sunshine is, many of us dog owners appreciate our dog walks being a little cooler (for us AND our canine companions!) in the fall.

I respond to multiple "dog in a hot car" calls in the summertime; however, some folks don't realize that I also get that type of call in the fall. Because our weather begins to cool down, and often the mornings are chilly, dog owners bundle up and take their dogs with them on errands and such, thinking their vehicle will stay cool enough for their beloved pet while they are in grocery shopping or eating lunch in a café. What can possibly happen, though, is that the clouds clear,


and the sun comes out, causing the temperature to rise—this can cause vehicles to heat up very rapidly, and that can quickly become a dangerous health situation for the dogs.

Fresponded to a 911 call in autumn years ago, where the temperature outside was only 70 degrees, and there was a puppy in a vehicle parked in partial shade with all four windows part-way down. The puppy was excessively panting and frantic, and I could clearly see she was in distress; I used my thermometer to check the interior temperature of the vehicle, and it was 104 degrees! Lalways check multiple times to make sure the reading is correct, and all three times, it read 104 degrees. Limmediately removed the overheated puppy from the

vehicle and rushed her to the local vet hospital, where she was properly cooled down and given fresh water, and thankfully, quickly and completely recovered! Through my training and experience it was clear to me, had the puppy been left in that vehicle much longer, she would have suffered heat prostration (hyperthermia) and could have died. Thank goodness for the caring citizen who called us to respond!

Let's all be mindful when bringing our doggies with us in our vehicles; we all certainly enjoy their company and getting out and about; however, they depend on us to keep them safe, so we need to do that!


BALLPARK BANNER SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

Reporting Crime is Important!

All of us have been there, a crime occurs, but it's not major, and we're just glad nobody was hurt. We think about calling the police, but through our own system of thought, we convince ourselves it is no big deal; "why bother?" "I don't have the serial number," or "The police are busy with important stuff." These and other excuses may seem reasonable, but there are very good reasons to report crime.

- If you don't report it to the police, we do not know what happened. And because we are evidence-based, no report means all is well in your neighborhood.
- Crime stats are checked on a neighborhood for possible reallocation of boundaries and officers.
 If you have not reported your criminal activity, you may lose officers to a busier part of the city.

So the important thing is to report it: emergency or crime-in-progress, call 911.

Protect your drainfield and reserve areas

- X No structures, parking, livestock, roof drainage or runoff near the drainfield
- × No irrigation or sprinkler systems near the drainfield
- Plant only grass or shallow-rooted plants
- Contact your local health department or health district for a map of your drainfield

Regularly inspect your drainfield

- Check for odors, wet spots, or surfacing sewage
- If your drainfield has monitoring ports, check them every few weeks; ports that continually contain over six inches of water could indicate a problem





RESIDENT PRIORITY:

Effective January 1, 2010, the City of Des Moines implemented a Resident Discount Policy offering residents discounted fees for recreation programs. Non-residents and city residents who choose not to provide proof of residency will be assessed the full fee for programs.

The Resident Discount (RD) Fee is available to residents living within the City of Des Moines' jurisdictional boundaries and Senior Adults. To qualify for the RD Fee, participants must provide proof of residency such as: valid picture ID with a Des Moines address or valid picture ID accompanied by a utility bill with their Des Moines

Address. Sports Teams qualify for the RD Fee when 51% of their players are Des Moines residents (proof of residency will be requested).

The full program fee will be charged to participants who are not Des Moines residents or choose not to provide proof of residency. Questions related to residency should be directed to 206-870-6527.
