## Street Resurfacing Projects Scheduled

The City of Des Moines this summer and fall will be repaying severstreets throughout the City. The design work is complete and construction is scheduled to begin in June.


Some of the streets will require a simple asphalt overlay, while others will require some major patching before the street is overlayed. There will be some delays and detours associated with the improvements, but efforts will be made to minimize these impacts.

## Help Make City Safe for Pedestrians

Have you ever enjoyed an afternoon walk in the downtown Des Moines area, window shopping, having an ice cream cone or a latte? As you strolled around town you tried to



Last year thousands of people in this country lost their lives while crossing the street. Most of the pedestrians killed are children, elderly persons, or persons who have been drinking. Unfortunately, studies have shown that as many as 95 percent of all drivers in King County don't stop for pedestrians. This is a serious concern for Des Moines residents.

State law says that crosswalks exist at all intersections, except where prohibited by signs. In 1990 a coalition of safety groups, health professionals, citizen activists, and law enforcement representatives worked together to pass a stronger state crosswalk law. The new law



focused the attention of the public on pedestrian saby changing the obligation of the driver from yield to stop when pedestrians were attempting to cross at legal crosswalk locations.

At any crosswalk (marked or unmarked), drivers must stop when pedestrians are trying to cross.

Drivers must remember that in a battle between a 2,000 pound car and a 140-pound pedestrian, the car always wins. That means drivers may have to be delayed slightly to allow a pedestrian to cross, but they may have just saved the pedestrian's life by offering him or her a safe chance to cross the road.

Pedestrians have the responsibility to chose an appropriate time to cross, giving drivers ample time to stop. While a pedestrian can stop in less than three feet, a vehicle traveling at 25 MPH will require 60 feet and at 35 MPH approximately 100 feet.

If drivers and pedestrians v together, by respecting the rights of each, they can help make Des Moines a safer place for everyone.

# New Zoning Studied for Properties Along Pacific Highway S.

he City of Des Moines is gearing up to study zoning and land use policies for properties near Pacific Highway South. Now that transportation engineers for Des Moines and the Washington Department of Transportation have prepared a preliminary design for roadway improvements for Pacific Highway South, City planners hope to promote revitalization and redevelopment on private property in this area of the Waterland City. The area to be studied is roughly bounded by Interstate 5 on the east, and the west side of Pacific Highway South, from South 216th Street to Kent-Des Moines Road.

Examples of land-use issues to be studied include how tall buildings may be, where off-street parking is located, and whether buildings may contain residences, businesses, or some of both. The City presently has neighborhood plans for the downtown and the Port of Seattle buyout area, and this new plan would address the neighborhoods along



# Citizen Input Is Welcome!

The City of Des Moines wants to hear from interested citizens as this planning project unfolds. To promote input from citizens, the City Council has asked the Des Moines Planning Agency, a citizens' advisory board, to gather public comments and to prepare draft land use policies and regulations.

Ultimately, both the Planning Agency and the City Council will hold public hearings before any decisions are made. State Route 99. Discussions are just beginning and public meetings will be advertised once some initial ideas have been put to paper.

Some of the topics being discussed may result in significant changes to the area. For example, in order to take advantage of views and to promote redevelopment, limitations on building height could be raised to allow buildings 10 or more stories. Existing rules limit building height to 35 feet. Planners also are discussing allowing buildings to be built with condominiums or apartments over street-level shops and offices.

## Directions to the Des Moines Creek Trail

For persons attending the July 18 dedication of Des Moines Creek Trail, or if you aren't sure how to find the trail, here are directions to Des Moines Neighborhood connector trails for the main trail and the dedication site. See page one for details about the dedication.

#### From Pacific Highway:

Turn west onto South 216th Street, turn right on 14th Avenue South, turn right on South 212th Street and proceed to the street end at 212th and 15th Avenue South. This connector trail extends approximately 1/4 mile to the main trail. Cross the creek and proceed north approximately 1/4 mile to the dedication site.

#### From Downtown Des Moines:

Turn right on Des Moines Memorial Drive, turn right on South 212th Street (which becomes South 211th Street and proceed to the streetend at 13th Avenue South. There is limited parking at this location. This connector trail extends about 200 feet to the trail. At the main trail turn left and proceed approximately 1/2 mile to the dedication site.

#### Directions to the SeaTac trail head:

From Pacific Highway South: Turn west at South 200th Street and proceed to the fenced parking area on the south side of the street across from Tyee Golf Course. Proceed down the trail to the dedication site approximately 1/2 mile ahead.







## Look Where You Can Recycle Now

Residents of Des Moines know what recycling is all about. You have been recycling now for six years and doing a fine job: 70% of the City's single family residents participate in recycling and 22% of multi-family residents do as well. Besides recycling at home everyone now can recycle while they are out having fun at the City's parks and Marina.

Thanks to funding support from King County and the State, Des Moines purchased special receptacles that will allow people to deposit recyclable materials in one side of the container and throw out trash in the other half. The sign on the top of the container says in which side to put recyclables and in which side to throw trash. Aluminum cans, plastic pop bottles and clean paper like newspaper can also be recycled in these

new containers. Other items like fast food wrappers, styrofoam food containers, used paper plates and utensils, wax coated pop cups with plastic tops, cardboard juice boxes, straws, candy wrappers, and all glass will need to be thrown into the trash.

The Marina is the first to install these new easy-to-use receptacles. Look for them the next time you're out taking a walk at the Marina.

# Responsible Pet Owners Make Good Neighbors

When the weather gets warmer, it becomes the "busy season" for the Des Moines Animal Control Officers. This is when the number of complaints increase about dogs doing their "business" in neighbors' yards, barking at night, chasing and biting children and joggers, running in packs, and cats fighting and digging in vegetable gardens.

Here are some suggestions on how residents can be responsible pet owners:

- Keep your pet under proper control, in the house, in a fenced yard or on a leash.
- Get your pet spayed/neutered. Unaltered pets want to roam, fight, bark, howl and are much more inclined to bite people than alternate pets.
- Have your pet trained. Pets that have learned manners and commands are better behaved in the home and out.



- Give your pet daily attention and exercise. Pets that have pent-up energy, are bored or neglected, tend to be noisy, destructive and want to run away.
- Keep identification on your pet.
   A pet that is lost can be returned home if it has a license tag on its collar.
- Keep your pet healthy by feeding it well and taking it to the vet for vaccinations and care. Healthy pets are happier and less apt to bother others.

Residents who are having problem with a neighbor's pet should find talk to the neighbor about the prolem. Often, the complaints can be resolved at this level. If this attempt does not work, please call an Animal Control Officer at (206) 870-6549.

# Third Runway Is Far From a 'Done Deal'

(The Airport Communities Coalition is comprised of the Cities of Des Moines, Normandy Park, Burien, Tukwila and Federal Way, and the Highline School District)

If there were no litigation by the communities against the Port of Seattle, construction on the third runway would be in full throttle. In fact, the Port assumed they would be using the runway by now. Litigation has literally stopped the bulldozers for years, buying the peace and quiet our communities deserve.

#### CONSTRUCTION: A TROUBLING SITE

Trucks and heavy machinery have begun to clog our roads. Why? Because the Port of Seattle continues to think it can play by its own rules and has begun the very early stages of construction for the proposed third runway at Sea-Tac Airport.

#### AS USUAL, THE PORT OF SEATTLE IS WRONG!

The third runway is not a done deal - no matter what the Port says. The Port of Seattle continues on this path at its own peril. As long as we in the airport communities continue to make ourselves heard and continue our lawsuits, we can preserve our cities.

#### AIRPORT COMMUNITIES KEEP UP THE FIGHT!

We forced government agencies to hold a public hearing on the Port's permit applications to destroy streams and wetlands. Hundreds of citizens – including state lawmakers, city officials and concerned citizens - gathered at that public hearing to oppose the Port's permit applications. At that hearing and elsewhere, we in the airport communities continue to speak out to preserve the environment for ourselves and our children. We are working to ensure that our children can achieve their best in quiet classrooms - free from the ear-splitting noise of jet engines.

#### COSTS ARE SKYROCKETING!

In 1992, the Port estimated a third runway would cost \$229 million. Now the Port says it will cost \$587 million - more than a 150 percent increase. And costs of overcoming long-term community impacts could easily surpass \$3 billion, according to a state-funded community impact study. The Port says taxpayers won't have to foot the bill for the most expensive runway in this nation's history. So who will pay? The airlines certainly don't want to. In Dallas, litigation between the community and the airport dragged on for several years. By the time litigation was over, the price tag was so steep that the airlines killed the most expensive part of the project.

#### KEEP OUR COMMUNITIES CLEAN AND LIVABLE!

The Port and the FAA had to revise their Environmental Impact Statement (something that has never been done before for any airport anywhere in the US!) because they totally underestimated the number of additional flights into Sea-Tac as a result of the proposed third runway. For 20 years, students in the Highline School District have suffered through ear-splitting aircraft noise while they were trying to learn to read, write, study Shakespeare and conquer calculus. A third runway means more planes, more noise and more kids having their school day disrupted.

The Port of Seattle is claiming it can create "new" wetlands to replace the ones it wants to destroy. The fact is, no one can promise that with complete certainty. Manmade wetlands can fail. Here's the only thing we know for sure: a destroyed wetland is gone forever. The Port of Seattle has meddled with Des Moines and Miller Creeks in the past and caused environmental harm, such as loss of fish and bird habitat. If construction moves forward, the watersheds around Des Moines and Miller Creeks will suffer further harm, including contamination caused by oil from construction machinery and the deicing chemicals used on airplanes.

#### FIGHTING IN THE COURTROOM

The Port of Seattle ignored state and federal environmental laws, and we're taking them to court to prove it. Several lawsuits will be heard in King County Superior Court over the summer. The Port will need hundreds of permits from several different jurisdictions to build the runway. These permits could be denied for a variety of reasons, including whether they comply with state environmental laws.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO!

Write to the Army Corps of Engineers, the US Environmental Protection Agency, and the Washington State Department of Ecology to protest the Port's plans to destroy fish habitats, streams and wetlands in South King County. Addresses are listed below.
