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
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A Letter to our Community

pathy and encouragement through these trying times will not be forgotten. We all feel the spirit of your good will.





Planning Continues for Pacific Hwy. S. Project

esign engineering is nearly complete for the Pacific Highway South Roadway Improvement Project (SR 99). This project extends from South 216th Street to Kent-Des Moines Road. The project will greatly improve safety and aesthetics in the Pacific Ridge neighborhood by widening the roadway, providing sidewalks, landscaped medians, lighting, traffic signals at South 220th Street and South 224th Street, and a signalized pedestrian crossing midway between Kent-Des Moines Road and South 224th Street. The project also provides high occupancy vehicle (carpool) lanes, bus pullouts, and additional intersection improvements.


Soon, property owners and businesses along Pacific Highway South will be contacted by the City's consultant who will be appraising property frontages needed for the roadway widening. This process will continue throughout the summer months. The City will be contacting all affected

property owners to discuss actual frontage needs, and to explain the acquisition process and the method of determining fair and equitable compensation for the right-of-way. Draft channelization plans and right-of-way plans are available for viewing at the City Public Works Department. If you are a property owner interested in seeing these plans in advance of the City contacting you, please call Assistant City Engineer Maiya Andrews at (206) 870-6523 or send an e-mail to: mandrews@cityofdesmoines.com in order to arrange an appointment. Please note that analysis of each property will be done during the appraisal process. Specific details of parking and access issues for each property will not be known until the appraisals are complete.

Right-of-way acquisition for this project will continue for the remainder of this year, and into early next year. The construction phase of this project is scheduled to begin in summer 2002.

Police Department Hosts Animal Control Officer Academy

the Des Moines Police Department during March hosted the fifth Animal Control Officer Academy (ACOA). Des Moines Animal Control Officer Jan Magnuson is the director and an instructor of the ACOA, which is sponsored annually by the Washington Animal Control Association and the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission.

The ACOA provides training to Animal Care and Control personnel in Washington and Idaho. Thirty-five instructors provided quality training to the 24 students this year. The training consists of basic law enforcement classes such as criminal law, search and seizure, investigative procedures, warrants, conflict resolution and self defense; and animal control classes, such as capture and restraint, dog and cat behavior, breed identification, handling of wildlife and cruelty investigations.

All enrolled students completed the two-week training, which included passing a final written exam and participating in mock scenarios at the Criminal Justice Training Center. The graduation ceremony on March 23 was attended by the students' families and supervisors, which included police and animal control personnel, and Des Moines Police Chief Don Obermiller.

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SURFACE WATER NEWS



ur last Surface Water News article gave a quick summary of the results of the water quality and health of the City's four major streams as reported in the recently completed 5-year Water Quality Monitoring Program. The areas of concern for all of the fish-bearing streams were:

- 1) fecal coliform bacteria.
- 2) low dissolved oxygen,
- 3) high temperature, and
- 4) water turbidity.

The streams involved in the study included Des Moines Creek, Massey Creek, Barnes Creek and McSorley Creek.

What can you do to improve the water quality and health of our streams?

- Take care of your septic system. Inspect your system every year and pump it out as necessary. Regular maintenance prevents solids from entering into and clogging the drain field (and prevents very costly repairs). Avoid flushing harmful materials that affect the operation of the system and can contaminate the groundwater. Use water wisely keep water usage to below the designed daily flow of the system (450 gallons per day for a 3-bedroom home). Online information is available at www.metrokc.gov. Contact your local sewer district to find out about hooking up to a sanitary system.
- Take care of your pets. Keep pets out of the streams and clean up after pets and dispose of wastes in an appropriate

container.

- Inspect your car for oil leaks. The street storm system discharges into our creeks and the Puget Sound.
- Preserve plants and trees adjacent to streams, lakes and wetlands. These plants provide shade to cool the temperature as well as habitat and refuge for fish and other aquatic life.
- Reduce pesticide use and if used, read the product label carefully for how it is to be applied.
- Reduce lawn fertilizers. Fertilizers remove dissolved oxygen from our streams.
- Wash your car at a car wash facility or location where runoff will drain to a grassy area and not the storm collection system.
- Community car wash events should use a free Clean Water Pump Kit available from the King County Department of Natural Resources (206) 322-9296. Des Moines is looking into getting some of these kits as well.
- Save hazardous wastes and paints for the semi-annual collection event at the Des Moines Marina. Please do not rinse or clean paint brushes in or around the storm system.

City Sustains Little Damage in Earthquake

ednesday February 28, 2001, at approximately 10:54 a.m. an earthquake of 6.8 magnitude shook the City of Des Moines and surrounding communities. Fortunately, the City sustained very little damage in comparison to what might have been.

Within minutes the various departments were out inspecting for damage. Bridges, roadways, buildings (including schools and retirement centers), streets, storm drainage, Marina piers, etc. were among the facilities that were checked. It was a joint effort by various City Departments including, Community Development, Police, Parks, Marina and Public Works assisted by the local fire and utility districts.

A consultant from Reid Middleton Engineers was called in to inspect the Saltwater Park Bridge that had been closed earlier for precautionary measures. With the assistance of Fire District #26, Chief Jim Polhamus and the department's elevated platform truck, the engineering consultant was able to complete the close-up inspection within a couple hours.

The consultant also accompanied City personnel during inspection of the piers at the Marina and certain buildings including the Senior Center. The City sustained relatively minimal damage estimated at \$75,000, which has been submitted to the Washington State Disaster Center for FEMA assistance.

Thanks to the above mentioned City departments, fire and utility districts, as well as Reid Middleton, for their prompt response and assistance to the situation that was at hand. It was a cooperative effort and good training for any future emergencies.

Slide Repair Project on 16th Avenue South Rescheduled for Early Summer

ue to delays in acquiring permits, the 16th Avenue South slide repair project that was slated to start last fall is now scheduled for this summer, perhaps as early as June.

The project is located between the cross streets of Kent-Des Moines Road and S. 240th Street. Due to the confined area, type of equipment involved and critical work around a high-pressure gas main, it will be necessary to close the road between Kent-Des Moines Road and 240th Street for a minimum of four months. Traffic will be detoured around the site to Pacific Highway South and Marine View Drive during the closure period.

The proposed repair includes the replacement of the existing concrete box culvert with a new 12-foot span by 6-foot high steel arch culvert. The new culvert will be better aligned with the creek channel, thereby reducing erosion at the inlet and outlet, and will be lengthened to better match the grade of the stream. The size of the new culvert will provide for a 100-year frequency storm and allow passage of fish

(the existing culvert was a major fish passage barrier). Other elements of the project will be roadside drainage from the west shoulder of 16th Avenue to the creek and installing gabion (rock-filled steel baskets) headwalls at both ends of the culvert to support the shoulders of the road.

As part of the project, 16th Avenue will be repaved from the culvert area to Kent-Des Moines Road. The new pavement is necessitated by the water main replacement project, done by the Highline Water District following a break earlier this year and by a sewer pipeline bypass project, completed last year (on the west shoulder of 16th Avenue South) by the Midway Sewer District.

The existing road culvert was washed out during a major storm that occurred on Thanksgiving Eve of 1998 causing a major 18-inch high-pressure gas main to be exposed and the rupture of an eight-inch sewer main, causing raw sewage to spill into Massey Creek.
