BOND ISSUE FOR NEW POLICE STATION ON NOV. 8 BALLOT

es Moines residents will be voting Nov. 8 on a bond issue to build a new police station.

The new police station would be located south of the existing police department on 11th Avenue South (south and adjacent to the Water District 54 water tower site). The site currently has three older houses on it.

If the \$3.97 million bond issue is approved by the voters, property owners would pay an additional 26 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation over a 15-year period. The owner of a \$140,000 house would pay an additional \$36.40 in test annually, beginning in 1995.


Why a new police station?

As Des Moines has grown in population, the police force has also grown. The current police station was built in 1979 when the City was approximately 6,000 population and the police force numbered 10. Now the City is 21,404 population and the police force has grown proportionately. They've simply run out of room at the current police facility.

What was once a records storage room is being used as an office for five detectives and a sergeant. Records are stored in a dirty loft in a Public Works garage. What was once the jail is now used for storage; a former jail cell is the office for the D.A.R.E. officer. Female police officers must use a converted public bathroom to change clothes since they have no locker room. The officers' lunch room also serves as an interview room, a conference room and the only place where officers can sit down and write up reports.

"Everything here now, every room, is ing used for some other purpose than it was designed for,' said Lt. Mitch Barker.

The proposed new police station at



The proposed police station on 11th Ave. S. is designed to fit in with the neighborhood.

15,000 square feet will be three times as large as the current facility and will provide adequate space for necessary offices, interview and conference rooms, and records storage.

It will provide the space needed to operate a police force of the size needed for a city of 22,000 and larger. It is designed to meet the needs of the City through the year 2014, when Des Moines' population is projected to be 35,000.

ity officials have worked with area residents to ensure the new police building and landscaping will blend into the surrounding single family neighborhood. The police building is designed for maximum flexibility so it can be adapted for unforeseen future needs.

The bond issue also includes funds to renovate the existing police station and relieve overcrowding at the City Hall and Public Works complex.

The Finance Department currently is in the middle of the administrative area at

City Hall with no direct public access. In the Public Works complex where Community Development is now situated, engineers and planners work in a windowless room designed for storage, and the parks department shares overcrowded work and locker room space with public works personnel.

To create more room at City Hall and the Public Works building, the Legal Department and Community Development Department would be moved to the current police station.

The bond issue requires 60 percent yes vote for approval.

IT'S OFFICIAL: 'BIG CATCH PLAZA'

The new plaza at the north end of Marine View Drive in Des Moines officially has a name: "Big Catch Plaza." The name was submitted by local resident Verla A. Turner in a "Name Your Park" contest. The name is taken from the sculpture "The Big Catch" by artist Richard Beyer, which will be erected at the plaza.

Now that the widening of Marine View Drive across Des Moines Creek has been completed, work on the plaza can begin. A City parks official said construction of the plaza, including landscaping, installation of the sculpture and personalized tiles, should be completed this November.

More than 500 personalized tiles were sold by the Des Moines Chamber of Commerce in a fund-raiser.

BUDGET WORK UNDERWAY

The City Council will be working on the 1995 City budget in the weeks ahead. On Oct. 6, the Finance Director will present a budget overview to the City Council, and the City Manager will present the preliminary budget to the Council at a subsequent meeting.

The general public will have an opportunity to give input on the budget at a Nov. 17 public hearing, 7:30 p.m. in the Council chambers.

The Council will adopt the final budget at either the Nov. 17 or Dec. 8 Council meeting.

City Council meetings are open to the public. They are held at 7:30 p.m. at City Hall, 21630 11th Ave. S.

FLU SHOTS FOR SENIORS

Flu shots will be given at the Des Moines Senior Center on Thursday, Nov. 3 from 9:30 - 11:30 a.m. to anyone over 55 years of age. The cost is \$8.50 per shot. Medicare Part B will reimburse the senior \$6.82. The remaining \$1.62 is a donation to the Center.

Seniors must bring their Medicare cards with them. The Senior Center is not able to bill other insurance companies. Members of Group Health or any other Health Maintenance Organization will not be reimbursed for any portion of the cost. For more information, call the Center at 878-1642.

MARINA DREDGED

Visitors to the Des Moines Marina this fall surely noticed the large crane stationed on a barge at the entrance to the marina.

The machinery was used to dredge the entrance channel to its designated depth of -13 feet. According to marina manager Joe Dusenbury, 5,000 to 6,000 cubic yards of sand were removed from the entrance which had become too shallow and narrow.

Dusenbury said the accumulation of sand in the entrance is a natural occurrence and the dredging is required about every 10 years.

Current drainage projects

South 216th Street: Our drainage and maintenance crews are currently working on improving the drainage and pavement at South 216th and 7th Place South. (You may have noticed a large puddle after a storm at the east side of the bend where the new street improvements begin.) Public Works crews have installed two new catch basins and 35 feet of pipe to collect this water. The City also plans to pave this sharp curve to remove this rather bumpy ride and direct the storm water to he new catch basins.

Marine View Drive: Public Works recently installed an inlet and 40 feet of pipe along the east side of Marine View Drive just north of South 230th Street. This will help collect water from behind the new sidewalk and prevent water from flowing over the sidewalk at the bus stop located there.

City Park: Easement agreements have been collected for installation of a bypass pipeline to the Des Moines City Park (located along the south side of Kent-Des Moines Road near the intersection of 21st Avenue).

Citizens can help in surveys of local streams

Who are those strangers in my back yard?? And why are they all wet?

If they are working in the stream and wearing blue hats, they are likely stream biologists making our initial stream survey of the City's four streams – Massey Creek, Des Moines Creek, Barnes Creek and McSorley Creek.

The stream survey is the first task of the new Water Quality Monitoring Program. Our consultant, Herrera Environmental, will be conducting a habitat survey that will study stream form, bank stability, the degree of vegetation, fish habitat and determining locations for collecting and classifying stream crustaceans and insects. The consultant will also be looking for locations for placing stream gauges that will later be used for logging stream flows and levels.

There are also opportunities for you to get involved in the program. We are currently seeking volunteers to help collect "bugs" and to read the gauges. A workshop has tentatively been set for Saturday, October 22 and will be four to six hours of instruction and field work. The workshop promises to be very informative as well as a lot of FUN. (We are also expecting guests from Trout Unlimited – Des Moines Chapter). Space is limited so please call now and register.

LOCAL SERVICES

As a reminder to property owners within Des Moines, the following services are offered:

- Property owners who wish to have the ditch in front of their property replaced with drainage pipe and covered may do so for the cost of the materials only. Over the years, many people in Des Moines have taken advantage of this service. If you are interested in more information, contact Wayne Matthews at 870-6567.
- Services provided to owners of commercial, multi-family residential and non-profit (churches, public facilities, etc.) properties include cleaning of on-site detention systems. The property owner is required to sign an agreement, which gives the city permission to enter onto the property and complete the work. There is no charge for this service; it was included as part of the SWM work program when the utility was formed in 1991. HAZARDOUS WASTE SPECIAL COLLECTION

Des Moines Marina South Parking Lot Saturday, Oct. 8 9 a.m. - 3 p.m.



The City of Des Moines is sponsoring a special collection and recycling event to reduce the amount of hazardous materials in our city. You can bring uncontaminated petroleum-based products such as oil filters, motor oil, brake fluid, transmission fluid, steering fluid, crankcase oil, kerosene, diesel oil and home heating fuel. You can also bring a maximum of 8 car, light truck or motorcycle tires. Truck tires will be charged \$8 per tire and tractor tires will cost \$14 per tire. Uncontaminiated anti-freeze will also be accepted as will lead acid batteries used by cars, trucks, marine or motorcycle engines. Please, no household batteries.

All other hazardous household erials such as cleaning products, ticides, paints, etc., can be disposed of through the WASTEMOBILE which will be in Renton from October 27 to November 5 and in Auburn from November 5 - 19. For exact times and locations call the Health Department Hazards Hot Line at 296-4692.

This collection event is open to anyone living in King County since the funding is primarily coming from the King County Local Hazardous Waste Management Program.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH
