AS PROMISED, 2017 HAS BEEN AN ACTIVE AND EXCITING YEAR so far for the City of Des Moines. The tough budgetary decisions that the City Council made in 2016 have begun to

pay off as the economic conditions of the City are improving. A sustainable and balanced budget was passed for 2017 that includes the addition of four new police officer positions. The hiring process has begun and residents should expect to see those additional officers on the street in the coming months. The health and safety of our residents is of the utmost importance to myself and the City Council and I would like to share with you some of the efforts the City is making to address these issues.

Community concern over crime in the City is at the forefront of our agenda. With the full support of the Council, the police department has been focused on

itegrating new crime analytics software chat will allow for the forecasting of crime trends. Coupled with a new evidence-based policing approach, the department will be able to better deploy its limited resources.

The Pacific Ridge neighborhood has long been considered a high crime area that has required a significant amount of the police department's resources. Recognizing the force multiplier effect regional partnerships can have in fighting crime, the police department has been working with neighboring cities, federal agencies, social service organizations, developers, business owners, political leaders, volunteers, and citizens living in the Pacific Ridge neighborhood. Through established partnerships, the goal is to create permanent change while providing a better way of life for citizens and businesses in the Pacific Ridge (Highway 99) area.

CONSISTENT COMMUNITY OUTREACH EFFORTS

Department personnel are continuing to establish dialogue with Pacific Ridge millies in collaboration with the Highline School District and Reach Out Des Moines. While specific directed patrol projects

are on-going in the Pacific Ridge area, staff continues outreach efforts to identify the area's grassroots leadership.

EVIDENCE BASED POLICING, TECHNOLOGY, AND DIRECTED PATROL EFFORTS

The police department is transitioning to a smarter policing process that uses current technology to target problem areas. These strategies include:

- Evidenced-Based Policing (EBP) is a balance strategy, leveraging high quality data and analysis of what works best in policing. Its objectives are crime prevention, criminal apprehension, improved police legitimacy and overall officer wellness. Using interventions which have been shown through scientific evidence to improve police effectiveness, is central to the concept of EBP. Simply, it's putting research into practice. It contrasts decisions based on rumors, assumptions, alternative agendas, traditions, longstanding approaches and general bad information.
- Hot Spot Policing (Place Based Policing): Focuses on small units of geography with high rates of crime. Place-focused instead of traditional people-focused approach. Focusing resources where crime is highly concentrated.
- Graffiti Abatement: Detecting and removing graffiti rapidly and routinely to prevent spreading.
- High Visibility Enforcement (HVE)
 Patrol: Identifying problem hot spots
 and using evidenced-based policing
 principles to target the issues.
- New Command Central Analytics assists in identifying and forecasting trends and hot spots.
- Code Enforcement: Aggressive enforcement and abatement of nuisance properties.

ESTABLISHING REGIONAL PARTNERSHIPS AND AGREEMENTS

The police department is working

with police department personnel from SeaTac, Port of Seattle, Kent, and Normandy Park to establish short and longer term projects that focus on high crime areas. Each department recognizes that one department alone cannot address the crime trends that impact each city in South King County. Each jurisdiction must remain engaged and connected in an effort to better share information on crime trends in a timely and effective manner. The SeaTac Police Department and the Des Moines Police Department are working on expanded partnership opportunities to better utilize resources to address issues in the Pacific Ridge Neighborhood, Updated radio frequency templating has made day-to-day communications more efficient. As time goes on, opportunities for expanded projects will no doubt create a better public safety model for that area.

EFFORTS THROUGHOUT DES MOINES

Despite the much needed emphasis in the Pacific Ridge area, the City Council is fully aware of community concerns regarding residential burglaries, mail theft, auto prowls, and other neighborhood livability issues and has been working hard to address these issues. The addition of four new officers will help, but it will not solve these problems. A combination of increased staffing, the identification and forecasting of trends to better predict where crime will occur, establishing regional partnerships, and the aggressive prosecution of offenders are all vital in order to ensure the safety and health of our citizens. All of these elements are priorities for the City Council in 2017.

In order for the City to make an impact

on crime, the community's involvement and support is essential. Intervention and prevention through community education is required for long-term change to happen. Police department personnel will continue with efforts to educate block- watch groups and increase communication. For more information on joining an existing block- watch group or creating one for your neighborhood, please contact Community Service Officer Tonya Seaberry at TSeaberry@desmoineswa.gov. An informed and educated community is central to everyday neighborhood safety and security.

CITY SUPPORT FOR SCIENTIFIC REVIEW OF POTENTIAL HEALTH AND WELL-BEING CONCERNS FROM AIRCRAFT EMISSIONS

In addition to the Council's aggressive approach to increase public safety, we are also looking at ways to increase the health of our citizens. The City is actively supporting an important piece of legislation that has been introduced in the state legislature by Representative Tina Orwall and Senator Karen Keiser (whose districts include Des Moines). The proposed legislation would fund a research study to be carried out by scientists at the University of Washington to place monitoring stations in proximity to the airport, record and then analyze data related to ultra-fine particle emissions from aircraft operations at SeaTac Airport.

SeaTac has been working with Alaska Airlines to increase utilization of biofuels which appear to lessen emissions. The ultra-fine particles are at the smallest end of the emissions range and many feel have not been adequately studied. The City has sent our representatives letters of support and has testified on behalf of the proposed legislation in both the House and Senate committees considering the bill.

NEXT STEPS

The City Council and City staff remain committed to enhancing the health and public safety of our community in 2017 and beyond. Change is not always easy or fast, but with the implementation of new public safety measures and effective leadership, the City will continue to move in a positive direction. As always, additional information on matters of interest involving the City as well as contact information for Council members and City staff can be found on our website www.desmoineswa.gov. The City Council and I continue to be excited by the many encouraging developments and activities that are occurring throughout our City and I can ensure you that as the City moves forward, the health, safety and quality of life of our residents will be a guiding principle in the decisions that we make.

Drivers are needed to help cover current half day shifts. The shifts are: 8:30 AM to noon and 12:30 PM to 4:00 PM. No one has to drive all day, although some of the drivers do. Four hours is a very small part of a person's week. We appeal to men and women. There is

no special driver's license required, just a warm smile and a love to drive locally helping others. Pay Parking in the Des Moines Marina and Beach Park

FOR ALMOST 50 YEARS THE DES MOINES MARINA has provided access to the Puget Sound for countless numbers of residents and visitors for a wide variety of uses. Boating and special events like the 4th of July Fireworks Over Des Moines and the Des Moines Waterfront Farmers Market are certainly the most visible activities but many people come to the Marina to walk along the promenade and the Des Moines Creek Trail, play on the beach or to fish from the Public Fishing Pier. Many things have changed in our society since the Marina opened in 1970 but one thing has remained constant: the demand for public access to the waters and shoreline of the Puget Sound.

In order to meet this demand, the City Council and staff have been carefully constructing a plan to ensure that the Marina will be able to sustain itself for future generations. When the City built the Marina it was set up as an "enterprise fund" which meant that the revenues from the moorage fees, fuel sales and

ther services provided to boaters were expected to cover all of the Marina expenses, including wages and debt payments. Fortunately, the Marina was an immediate financial success and has remained so until recently. No City taxes are used to pay for the operation of the Marina. The Marina has not only paid all of its expenses and debt service, but over the years Marina revenues have helped support the general operations of the City.

About four years ago, as our region and the country began to emerge from the worst recession in a generation, it became apparent that recreational boating in the Puget Sound, like in the rest of the country, was experiencing a significant decline. As a result, the City is no longer able to depend on revenues from the existing Marina enterprises to pay all the operating expenses. Also, to start replacing some of the major assets like the floating docks and the bulkheads, it will be necessary to take on debt, further taxing revenues. At that time the City's leaders began discussing other possible revenue sources in the Marina, including some commercial development and charging for parking in he Marina and Beach Park.

Early on in the discussions the Marina staff began a series of surveys to determine the demand for parking and extent of the "market area" (or where do the people who use the Marina and Beach Park for non-boating activities come from). As expected, the surveys showed that parking demand was seasonal, but surprisingly strong during the off-season

when the weather was good. The surveys also showed that the Marina and Beach Park are truly regional facilities with over 70% of the non-boating visitors coming from outside the City.

The data also lead to the conclusion that, for the future, it would be more equitable to develop new revenue streams based on user fees rather than taxes, because so many of the "users" come from outside the City. In early 2016 the City Council approved staff's proposal to install a pay parking system in the Marina and Beach Park. After a year of investigation

and planning, staff is now in the process of installing the system, with a target operational date early in April. City staff is in the process of surveying other regional facilities to develop the fees for parking and are planning on offering an access card to Des Moines Residents for an annual fee, similar to the program the State Parks have.

Last October, the City staff began meeting with Marina tenants and neighbors to discuss the implementation

of pay parking. The meetings will continue to be held on the third Wednesday of each month, starting at 5:30 PM. To engage the broader community, the meetings have been moved to the Activity Center located at 2045 S 216th Street and will continue



thru May or longer as needed to provide a forum for working out any problems that develop during the startup of the new system. The City encourages any interested parties to attend the meetings.

The City of Des Moines owns and operates two of the five waterfront facilities that provide public access to the Puget Sound for South King County's more than 500,000 residents. Sustaining and improving these facilities will remain one of the City's top priorities.

What does TBD & RTA mean?

RENEWING YOUR TABS? MANY OF OUR RESIDENTS WILL EXPERIENCE A STICKER SHOCK when they renew their tabs this year. The major increase

is largely a result of the passage of Sound Transit 3, a transportation package that was approved overall by voters in King, Pierce, and Snohomish Counties last November. The new tax can be found under the title RTA Excise Tax and raises the car-tab tax by 0.8% based on a vehicle's value. For a car worth \$10,000, it equals out to about \$80.

The only line items on your tabs collected by the City is under the title "T.B.D. - Des Moines". This stands for Transportation Benefit District, which is a state authorized taxing district that can raise revenue for specific transportation projects. The funds generated by the

Transportation Benefit District are used solely for transportation improvements that preserve and maintain the

transportation infrastructure of the City. These funds are used for improvements to preserve and maintain the City's previous investments in the transportation

infrastructure, reduce the risk of transportation facility failure, improve safety, continue the costeffectiveness of the City's infrastructure investments, and continue the optimal performance of the transportation system.


Of the \$40 collected under the T.B.D. line, \$20 goes towards roadway maintenance (pot holes, striping, signal maintenance, etc.) and \$20 goes towards arterial street paving. The City is planning to pave arterials annually beginning next year with South 223rd Street between Marine View Drive and 24th Ave South. It has been nearly a decade since the City has had a sustainable


source for paving roads, and many of the City's streets reflect the lack of investment in the roadway surfaces.

Community Development 101


A CITY PLANNER'S JOB IS TO HELP CITIZENS build a great community. Des Moines City planners (or just "planners" for short) work with the mayor, City Council, the police, engineers, business people, neighborhood groups, and many others to make our community the best place to live. Our planners do everything from developing long range land use plans to reviewing projects for compliance with local regulations such as zoning, design, and environmental protection as well as compliance with State and Federal regulations.

It sometimes seems as if planners speak a foreign language, what with all the initialisms and acronyms they use such as DNS (Determination of Nonsignificance), SEPA (State Environmental Policy Act), JARPA (Joint Aquatic Resource Permit Application), NOCA (Notice of Complete Application), GMA (Growth Management Act) and so on... Our planners are professional code readers, code talkers, and code interpreters. The Des Moines Municipal Code (DMMC) is their textbook, it can be found here: http://www.codepublishing.com/WA/DesMoines/

Your City Council adopts, modifies, and amends the code in order to pursue the Des Moines vision of "An inviting, livable, safe waterfront community,

embracing change for the future while preserving our past." (Des Moines 2035 Charting Our Course for a Sustainable Future). The Planners work with residents, property owners, developers and government agencies to ensure projects meet DMMC and State requirements. With questions ranging from, "What are the setbacks/zoning for this property?" to "What are the regulations for developing near the Shoreline?" answers can be quite complex.

Relying on the DMMC, our City Planners are dedicated to finding accurate answers as we continue the process of meeting the goals of the Des Moines Comprehensive Plan and the development regulations that our City Council has enacted. Housing Repair Assistance Program

SERVICES to City resident homeowners
who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes
based on U.S. Department of Housing
and Urban Development (HUD) income
guidelines. This is done by providing free
repair services to improve the health
and safety of our residents as they live in
their homes. Funding for this program is
provided by a Community Development
Block Grant through King County.

Services provided include but are not limited to:

Electrical – faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans

Plumbing – faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters

Disability Aids – installation of grab bars, hand rails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non skid surfaces



Safety – installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms and locksets

Other – faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE FREE SERVICES?

- 1. Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months, have proof of home owner's insurance, and meet the HUD income guidelines for the program.
- 2. Complete the application process

HOW DO I APPLY?

To apply for this program please follow these directions:

- 1. Request an application by calling 206-870-6535
- Complete the application forms and return them with the supporting documentation to the City of Des Moines/Minor Home Repair at: 21630 11th Ave. S. Ste. D, Des Moines WA 98198
- 3. Once your application is processed and evaluated you will receive a phone call informing you of your acceptance or non-eligibility for our program. Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. Services that are required for your health and/or safety are the highest priority.



Why should I care about climate change, and what can I do locally to help reduce it?



Trees absorb harmful carbon from the air.

NO MATTER WHERE YOU STAND ON CLIMATE CHANGE, it's important to understand its causes and what we can do to combat it.

At the end of a warm, sunny day, the air temperature lowers with the setting sun. However, imagine the air unable to cool down. This is what greenhouse, or "heat-trapping" gases like carbon dioxide, methane and others do in the atmosphere. They absorb the Earth's heat; the more gases present, the warmer the Earth's surface.

When it comes to climate, our Earth's air, water, and land are all related. The warmer it gets the more negatively impacted are people and the environment. Long term solutions are to rely less on burning fossil fuels for energy and a switch to greener technologies, while also capturing greenhouse gas emissions before they enter the atmosphere. Changes in our community can lead to other changes elsewhere.

Where do greenhouse gases come from?

- · Burning fossil fuels like coal, oil and natural gas.
- · Methane and nitrous oxide, mostly from agriculture and waste, are also sources.
- The EPA reports electricity and industry as the largest contributors in the US, but emissions from every country add to the problem (2016).

What are some of the problems associated with a warming climate?

- · Earlier snow and ice melt will cause a rise in sea levels.
- As oceans absorb more heat from the atmosphere and become warmer, stronger storms may develop.
- Changing rainfall patterns and more droughts could lower crop production, help weeds and pests to spread into new areas, and increase the risk of forest fires.
- Plants, insects, birds & wildlife will have to adapt to survive. Migration patterns will change.

What can I do to reduce the production of these "heat-trapping" gases?

- Start today by preserving existing trees and planting new ones. Trees absorb atmospheric
 carbon during photosynthesis and store it. Longer lived trees, like conifers, release it
 back into the environment slowly.
- Protect and preserve a variety of habitats to allow plants and animals to adapt to environmental changes.
- Protect and restore shorelines and stream buffers to provide natural, protective barriers
 against flooding, sea level rise, and wave action from stronger storms, all of which may
 come with climate change.
- · Reduce your own "carbon footprint."
 - » Use less energy overall and buy energy-efficient appliances and electronics.
 - » Take the bus, rideshare, and don't idle your vehicle.
 - » Save water. Look for leaks. It takes energy to treat and heat the water in your home.
 - » Reduce. Reuse. Recycle. Buy (and throw away) less stuff.
 - » Eat locally. Fuel emissions increase the further your food is transported.

About Levels

If your child has previous swim experience outside of our program or has been out of our lesson program more than 3 months we will require them to take a placement test to see where they fit within our lesson program. If they have never swam unassisted before they do not need a placement test and will be placed in the first level of their appropriate group.

About Age Groups

For children 6 months to 3 years old, we offer Parent-Tot classes where both you and your child get into the water.

For our group lessons we require that students be at least 3 years of age or older. Children ages 3-5 years old will be placed in our Pre-School section classes and children 6 and older will be placed in our Youth section classes.

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

Resident Priority:

Effective January 1, 2010, the City of Des Moines implemented a Resident Discount Policy offering residents discounted fees for recreation. programs. Non-residents and city residents who choose not to provide proof of residency will be assessed the full fee for programs.

The Resident Discount ("RD") Fee is available to residents living within the City of Des Moines' jurisdictional boundaries and Senior Adults. To qualify for the "RD" Fee participants must provide proof of residency such as: Valid picture ID with a Des Moines address, Valid picture ID accompanied by a utility bill with their Des Moines Address. Sports Teams qualify for the "RD" Fee when 51% of their players are Des Moines residents (proof of residency will be requested.)

The full program fee will be charged to participants who are not Des Moines residents or choose not to provide proof of residency. Questions related to residency should be directed to 206-



The City of Des Moines Parks Recreation and Senior Services strives to make all programs and activities accessible to all people regardless of income. Scholarships will be granted on a percentage discount, depending on individual circumstances. All information will remain confidential. To be eligible for a scholarship, you must reside within the city limits of Des Moines, WA and meet the family size/yearly income requirements. Applicants meeting eligibility guidelines are awarded up to \$150 per quarter per calendar year. Eligible residents will be required to provide proof of identification, residency, and income. Scholarship applicants must be approved prior to registration.
