



From the Mayor



FOR MORE THAN FORTY YEARS, DES MOINES HAS BEEN MY HOME. I have watched it grow from a small seaside bedroom community in the direction of a thriving, vital city. These changes have not occurred without growing

pains, yet I believe that the very essence of our small town identity has been preserved. Our civility for each other, our care and compassion for each other, still remain as a hallmark of our identity as a city. It has been my pleasure to serve you, first as President of the Highline School Board and now as Mayor of your city. Nonetheless, this remains a challenging time for our City and I want to recount some of these challenges and some bright lights on the horizon that will help guide our journey.

As has been the case with many smaller communities such as ours in the Puget Sound region and elsewhere, city revenues have been constrained. This has mostly come about because bedroom communities such as ours have relied heavily on property tax dollars as a primary source of revenue. During the robust

ulding periods that occurred in the early _J00's, smaller cities were in strong positions relative to their revenue and budgets. As the Great Recession lowered property values and property tax receipts, cities recognized the need to enhance their commercial development.

In the case of Des Moines, our ability to strengthen our commercial base will determine the types and availability of city services we can provide in the future. I would like to share with you some very positive things happening in the city. In the context of these changes and new developments, your City Council and I are committed to retaining and preserving the very best elements of our small town traditions even as we grow and become more self-reliant based on new revenues generated from development. Here are some of the things going on in the city:

- In February, 2016 the new Sheraton Four Points Hotel opened on Pacific Highway.
- The Des Moines Creek Business Park, located along 24th Avenue north of 216th represents a very successful partnership between the Port of Seattle, Panattoni Development Company and the City of Des Moines. There are three phases currently all under different phases of construction. The result is well over a million square feet of development.
- The Business Park will be the home of the new \$78 million regional Federal Aviation Administration office building that will have 280,000 square feet of office space and 1,600 employees.

- At build out, the Business Park will have several thousand employees. The city is working with Highline College and Business Park tenants to address the workforce needs of the new businesses opening in Des Moines. We are hoping to create employment opportunities for our city residents and students.
- We have also begun some early discussions regarding potential roles the Port could play as the city goes about redeveloping into a regional destination location. We believe there are significant opportunities for public/ private partnerships to redevelop city owned property, build appropriate infrastructure, create jobs, expand the city's retail base, and provide a catalyst for future development of the downtown.
- The historic Landmark on the Sound site has been purchased and the new owners are in the process of determining highest and best use for that marvelous, historic facility and grounds.
- Some very exciting plans for the old Des Moines Theater are underway. The new owner is looking for ways to interact with the community and our schools in music and other performing arts venues.
- There is new multi-family residential and mixed use development occurring downtown.

- Highline Place is being built adjacent to Highline College to provide office space for the college and international student housing on the upper floors.
- The light rail extension has plans for a station in close proximity to Highline College. This will provide huge positive impacts for the city and also encourages transit-oriented development in that area.
- Additionally, there are several housing developments moving forward in anticipation of the demand created by the developing business opportunities. These are some of the positive

developments occurring in Des Moines. As these projects come online, they will enhance the city's revenue picture and provide funds to invest in quality of life aspects for our residents. The new employees and business activity will also increase demand for quality retail options. That process will help us redevelop our downtown and marina.

We know that change is not always easy. These changes and others will be reported to you in the future. They will enhance our capacity to serve our residents and allow for us to enjoy shopping, dining and entertainment opportunities close to home.

Des Moines Beach Park Dining Hall Receives State's Top Preservation Honor

ON MAY 17, 2016 THE CITY RECEIVED the State Historic Preservation Officers Award for Outstanding Rehabilitation – the coveted Valerie Sivinski Award.

Each year the State Historic Preservation Officer recognizes achievement in historic preservation by recognizing outstanding rehabilitations of historic buildings and structures. Awards made in this category are named in honor of the late Tacoma historic preservation architect Valerie Sivinski.

The City of Des Moines received the award for its rehabilitation of the historic Dining Hall of the former Covenant Beach Bible Camp, now located in Des Moines Beach Park. This award recognizes the City for its vision and commitment to preserving the Dining Hall and former camp in the face of daunting funding, regulatory, and environmental circumstances.

In September 2015, the City also received the King County Executive's John D. Spellman Historic Preservation Award for exemplary achievement in the restoration of the Dining Hall.

The Dining Hall, built in 1934 located

in Covenant Beach Bible Camp Historic District at Des Moines Beach Park reopened in July 2015 after years of extensive rehabilitation. This local landmark is an iconic piece of our community's past and will now continue to serve future generations as an event facility available for weddings, receptions, corporate meetings and events.

Reopening in late summer 2016 is the park's historic Picnic Shelter and Restroom.

The Covenant Beach Bible Camp Historic District at Des Moines Beach Park consists of eight rustic craftsman style camp buildings influenced by Swedish heritage located within the eighteen acre park located at 22030 Cliff Avenue South in Des Moines, Washington. The setting includes Des Moines Creek which opens onto the saltwater beach of Puget Sound, archaeological components, natural features and a system of paths and trails connecting to the Des Moines Marina.

The City of Des Moines is once again providing minor home repair services to City resident homeowners who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes based on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines. This is done by providing free repair services to improve the health and safety of our residents as they live in their homes.

SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE:

- Electrical faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans
- Plumbing faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters
- Disability Aids installation of grab bars, handrails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non-skid surfaces
- Safety installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms & locksets
- Other faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE FREE SERVICES?

- 1. Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months and have proof of homeowner's insurance
- 2. Complete the application process



Lower Massey Creek Improvements Project

Construction is scheduled for this summer for the Lower Massey Creek Improvements Project located along the creek adjacent to Kent-Des Moines Road (KDM) west of Marine View Drive (MVD). The purpose of the project is to dramatically reduce flooding that occurs at the KDM/MVD intersection by widening the channel, constructing a flood control berm in the vacant land east of Taco Time, constructing a 200-foot long sheet-pile retaining wall along the south side of the creek, and installing a pump station. The project will also include installing native plantings along the stream, removing invasive species and installing fish habitat features such as woody debris, stream boulders and bank logs.

Presently, during large storms combined with high tides, the capacity of the channel is exceeded causing the creek overbank east of Marine View Drive. Flooding is further exacerbated by a very shallow storm drainage system that drains to Massey Creek and tends to back up when the creek levels rise, thereby preventing the intersection from draining until both the tide and creek levels lower. This project will increase the capacity of the channel to prevent the overbanking. The high-flow pump station will also be used to rapidly drain the intersection for flooding that may occur with the high creek levels.

Reed Trucking & Excavation, Inc. has been awarded the construction contract and Tetra Tech will be providing construction management services for the project. While the project is allowing 130 working days for the project, most of the creek work will occur during the summer months from June 15th to September 30th. The project is scheduled to be completed by November 1. Two way traffic will be preserved along Kent-Des Moines Road with temporary interruptions for delivery or haul of equipment and materials.

Neighborhood Parks Maintenance Reduced in 2016

DUE TO THE 2016 CITY OF DES MOINES BUDGET SHORTFALL, some City parks will have reduced landscape maintenance and watering in 2016.

Community and Waterfront Parks that will not be affected are Des Moines Beach Park, Des Moines Marina, Des Moines Creek Trail, Des Moines Field House Park, Steven J. Underwood Memorial Park and the Des Moines Activity Center. These parks have the highest public usage as well as generate revenue to help pay for their associated maintenance costs, so maintenance standards and watering will not be reduced at these facilities.

However, the City's neighborhood parks such as: Cecil Powell Park, City Park, Des Moines Memorial Park, Dr. Shirley Gordon Park, Kiddy Park, Midway Park, Overlook I, Overlook II, Parkside Park, Water Tower Park, Westwood Park, Wooton Park, and S. 251st Park will receive a reduced level of maintenance. The budget to pay for the irrigation has been cut by \$10,000, which means that these parks will receive limited irrigation. In addition, the scheduled grounds maintenance and mowing by the City's contracted maintenance service will be reduced from 39 to 26 times annually.

During the upcoming growing season, you can expect to see less weeding and lawn manicuring with the potential for browning lawns. Please rest assured that the City's Park Maintenance crews will do all that they can to follow best maintenance practices, look at all efficiencies available to them and provide the best service possible within budgetary limitations.

The City's Conservancy Parks and connector trails such as Des Moines Creek Park, Woodmont Park, Sonju Park, Barnes Creek Trail, and Redondo Trail currently receive minimal maintenance and will not be further effected by the cuts at this time. However, severe cuts made to the parks maintenance budget over a decade ago reduced much needed ongoing removal of weeds and invasive plants such as English ivy which have damaged trees and crowded out native plants.

Citizens, service clubs and private organizations and neighborhood groups are encouraged to join volunteer efforts to help protect these valuable park resources. 

Cats and Rats and Groundhogs, Oh My!

Coexisting with nuisance wildlife and domestic animals

WILDLIFE IS EVERYWHERE, and is one of the wonderful aspects of living in beautiful Des Moines and the surrounding areas! We have lots of lush trees, bushes, grasses and flowers, which is ideal habitat for native critters. However, they can be problematic to the gardener if not kept at bay, so here are some tips that may help you:

DO <u>NOT</u> LEAVE ANY FOOD SOURCES AVAILABLE. That includes unsecured compost piles, unsecured garbage, rotting ground fruit, loose prey animals (often chickens), or any type of animal food (whether for domestic pets or wildlife).

DO ATTEMPT TO COEXIST WITH

WILDLIFE. They were here first and we need to all get along. Trapping is usually unsuccessful in the long run, as even once a particular critter is gone, another one (or more) just move in to take its place! Jaw traps are illegal and even humane traps can cause injury if misused or damaged. In addition, once an animal like a raccoon is trapped, it is no longer legal to "relocate" it, it must be released unharmed where it was caught or destroyed. Poisons are problematic for a multitude of reasons, one being that even if the "target" animal is affected, it can then be touched or eaten by a non-target animal (or human) and can sicken or kill.

DO TRY DIFFERENT METHODS OF

REPELLENTS. There are many types, and sometimes one may not work that well for you, but another may work just dandy. So keep trying! Most can be found at lawn and garden stores, feed stores, or on the internet. Some examples:

- Motion-sensor water sprinklers, lights, or noise makers
- Flashing laser light units (especially for nocturnal animals)
- Repellant products such as gels, crystals and sprays (my favorite is "Critter Ridder"). Sometimes just plain black pepper works.
- Fencing and netting (top netting is often very easy to install and is usually inexpensive)
- Flash tape, pinwheels and mylar or eye balloons
- Predator figures such as owls, hawks or eagles
- Electric fencing ("Fido Shock" brand is a low-impact unit)

You can also call the Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife for more information at 425-775-1311.

When it comes to domestic pets such as dogs or cats coming into your yard and damaging your garden, please give me a call at 206-870-6549 or email me at JMagnuson@desmoineswa.gov so I can assist you. We have leash laws for ALL domestic animals in the City of Des Moines, so even cats are not legally allowed to roam at large.

You can use the above mentioned repellents for domestic animals, as often that solves the problem! However, if you continue to have issues with loose dogs or cats, we recommend you initially contact your neighbors to see if they own the offending pets and let them know that you don't appreciate them damaging your lawn and garden. If that fails, I can assist you in taking enforcement against the pet owner. Thank You and Happy Gardening!

How do native trees and other plants make Des Moines a healthier environment?

ASK AN ECOLOGIST

I moved to the Seattle area for many reasons, but what led me here most was a desire to be wedged between the mountains and the ocean and stand streamside beneath green conifers towering over my wet umbrella. To live around diverse, healthy habitats is a privilege; it's our responsibility as a community to enhance and steward our creeks, forests, and backyards which benefit us all.

Here are ten good reasons to plant, preserve and protect trees, shrubs and native landscapes:

- It takes one acre of trees (with 100% canopy) to provide enough oxygen for eight people (International Society of Arborlculture, 2007).
- Trees absorb excessive carbon dioxide (one of the gases responsible for global warming) in the atmosphere and store it over their lifetimes. Longer lived trees release it back into the environment more slowly.
- Trees can remove trace hazardous chemicals to improve air quality.
- Plant roots bind soil, reduce erosion, and filter and take up common pollutants, thereby improving water quality.
- Trees provide shade to reduce ultraviolet radiation and lower air temperatures.
- Trees and shrubs shield high winds.
- A variety of native trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants provide food sources and habitat to many types of wildlife and insects. Decaying trees provide essential nesting cavities. Leave "snags" standing when possible.
- Mature trees increase property values.
- Trees and native landscapes inspire creativity, poetry, even love, and have a positive effect on health.

• Plants are cool and make people happy. The benefits of trees and other plants are clear, but we must each contribute. The cliché, "hug a tree," means much more when you attach their value. Our combined property substantially benefits not only wildlife, but our community as a whole. Let's plant, preserve and protect to make Des Moines a beautiful, healthy place to visit or call home.



From the Bench



Fade up. The suspect sits alone at a table in a dimly lit room. Just outside the door, he hears the business of the precinct – the clank of hand-cuffs, the protestations of an intoxicated defendant,

and the sound of laughter coming from a distant office. Beads of sweat begin to form on his brow. He counts the tiles on the floor to calm himself. After what seems like hours, the detective enters the room and sits at the table across from him. "You have the right to remain silent. Anything you say can and will be used against you in a court of law..."

Sound familiar? Most of you can recite Miranda warnings from watching any garden-variety crime show on television. But do you know *why* law enforcement is required to administer these warnings? The answer lies in the very "roots of our concepts of American criminal jurisprudence."¹

In the landmark case, *Miranda v. Arizona*, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination requires that an individual who is taken into custody "must be warned prior to any questioning that he has the right to remain silent, that anything he says can be used against him in a court of law, that he has the right to the presence of an attorney, and that if he cannot afford an attorney one will be appointed for him prior to any questioning if he so desires."^{2 3}

The case began in March of 1963 with the arrest of Ernesto Miranda on suspicion of kidnapping and rape. He was transported to the local precinct and placed in an interrogation room. Two hours later, officers emerged with a signed confession.⁴ The State used Miranda's confession against him at trial. He was convicted by a jury and sentenced to 20 – 30 years in prison. Miranda appealed his conviction on the grounds that law enforcement obtained his confession in violation of his constitutional rights. Miranda's case was one of four separate cases consolidated for review by the Supreme Court.

The cases shared many similarities - in each case, the defendant was questioned by law enforcement (or an agent of law enforcement - one of the cases involved questioning by a prosecuting attorney.) In each case, the defendant was isolated during questioning, "cut off from the outside world." No attorney was present for any of the interrogations and none of the defendants were meaningfully informed of their rights prior to the start of the interrogation. And in every case, the questioning elicited confessions.⁵

- 4. IF YOU CANNOT AFFORD TO HIRE A LAWYER, ONE WILL BE APPOINTED TO REPRESENT YOU BEFORE ANY QUESTIONING IF YOU WISH.
- 5. YOU CAN DECIDE AT ANY TIME TO EXERCISE THESE RIGHTS AND NOT ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS OR MAKE ANY STATEMENTS.

WAIVER

DO YOU UNDERSTAND EACH OF THESE RIGHTS I HAVE EXPLAINED TO YOU? HAVING THESE RIGHTS IN MIND, DO YOU WISH TO TALK TO US NOW?

On these facts, the sole legal issue before the Supreme Court was whether "statements obtained from an individual who is subjected to custodial police interrogation" are admissible against him in a criminal trial and whether "procedures which assure that the individual is accorded his privilege under the Fifth Amendment to the Constitution not to be compelled to incriminate himself" are necessary.⁶

In order to decide the issue at hand, the Court examined actual police interrogation techniques taken from various law enforcement training manuals. Isolating the suspect, employing deception and trickery, and creating an "atmosphere of domination" were among the techniques highlighted by the Court.7 Especially troubling to the Court was the practice of isolating a suspect and engaging in "incommunicado interrogation." This, according to the Court, creates an inherently intimidating atmosphere - one which "exacts a heavy toll on individual liberty and trades on the weakness of individuals." In such a case, the "potentiality for compulsion is forcefully apparent."

Finding that these methods undermine the 5th Amendment privilege against selfincrimination, the Court concluded that "unless adequate preventive measures are taken to dispel the compulsion inherent in custodial surroundings, no statement obtained from the defendant can truly be the product of his free choice." ⁸ The "adequate preventive measures" included not only the requirement of Miranda warnings prior to any custodial interrogation but also the exclusion at trial of any statements obtained in violation of *Miranda*.

The Court's decision in *Miranda* was met with immediate and wide-spread controversy. Liberals hailed *Miranda* as a victory for individual rights while conservatives derided the Court for judicial over-reach that would compromise the efforts of law enforcement to solve crimes. Despite the political hay made of *Miranda*, law enforcement immediately adapted their procedures in order to comply with Most of you can recite Miranda warnings from watching any garden-variety crime show on television. the Court's mandate. Thus, despite the dire warnings of *Miranda's* detractors, the police continued to investigate crimes and prosecutors continued to secure convictions.

As for Ernesto Miranda, he was retried following his victory at the Supreme Court. This time around, the State could not use his confession at trial. Rather, the State offered the testimony of new witnesses to make its case. Once again, Miranda was convicted by a jury and sentenced to 20 - 30 years in prison. He was paroled in 1972 and upon his release, he autographed and sold policeissued "Miranda Cards" to make money. He spent the rest of his life in and out of jail on various petty crimes and parole violations. He died in 1976 as a result of injuries he suffered from a bar-room brawl.⁹

As one of the nation's most famous criminal law cases, *Miranda v. Arizona* is remarkable for a number of reasons. First, *Miranda* was one of several cases decided by the Warren Court that dramatically expanded civil rights and civil liberties.¹⁰ Second, *Miranda* resulted in immediate and fundamental changes to then-current police practices. (To ensure compliance with *Miranda*, officers were (and still are) issued small cards to carry with them on patrol containing the text of the Miranda warnings.) Finally, despite early attempts at legislative "fixes" by those opposed to its procedural requirements, *Miranda* has stood the test of time - even after 50 years and a number of subsequent decisions carving out various exceptions, *Miranda* emains the law of the land.

So, the next time you hear those familiar Miranda warnings on your favorite episode of "Law & Order", remember that *Miranda* is more than words – it is an enduring and important element of the American criminal justice system.

Parkside Park Renovation Underway This Summer

Parkside Park, which was transferred to the City from King County in 1993, is long overdue for a renovation. In past years, the play equipment and sports court has deteriorated and the park has become overgrown with vegetation. In 2015, the City applied for a \$395,000 Community Development Block Grant to renovate the park and make necessary improvements for park safety. The park design includes improvements for ADA accessibility by enhancing the park entrances on S. 244th Street and S. 242nd Street, the north-south trail through the park and providing a new neighborhood park entrance and trail from 26th Place South. Other improvements include the creation of a sports court and the installation of outdoor fitness equipment with funding from a \$25,000 King County Youth Sports Facilities Grant.

As part of the state's Tacoma Smelter Plume Soil Safety Program, the Department of Ecology tested the play areas at the park for arsenic and lead and found approximately 10,000 square feet of arsenic contaminated soil above the state clean-up levels.

The state will contribute the funds needed for the removal and replacement of soil located in the park. Soil remediation will take place during the park renovation project.

The park project is planned to go out to bid this summer and for construction to be completed in October of this year. For more information call Patrice Thorell at 206-870-6527.



Resident Priority:

Effective January 1, 2010, the City of Des Moines implemented a Resident Discount Policy offering residents discounted fees for recreation programs. Non-residents and city residents who choose not to provide proof of residency will be assessed the full fee for programs.

The Resident Discount ("RD") Fee is available to residents living within the City of Des Moines' jurisdictional boundaries and Senior Adults. To qualify for the "RD" Fee participants must provide proof of residency such as: Valid picture ID with a Des Moines address, Valid picture ID accompanied by a utility bill with their Des Moines Address. Sports Teams qualify for the "RD" Fee when 51% of their players are Des Moines residents (proof of residency will be requested.)

The full program fee will be charged to participants who are not Des Moines residents or choose not to provide proof of residency. Questions related to residency should be directed to 206-870-6527.


