Emergency Assistance To Seniors and Veterans

What is E.A.T.S.?

The City is initiating the Emergency Assistance to Seniors and Vets (EATS) program. The EATS program will provide additional meals for Seniors and Military Veterans while also infusing \$10,000 a month into our local economy. The City, using resources from the King County Seniors and Vets Levy, will purchase \$2,500 in vouchers from a different local restaurant each week and provide the vouchers to our seniors. The City will also be working with the Laborers International Union of North America (LIUNA!), Local 242 (located in Des Moines) to provide vouchers to our Veterans.



Why create EATS?

The Des Moines Mayor and City Manager felt it was critical to find ways to infuse capital into our local economy, support our hard-working restaurants, and expand the provision of meals for our Seniors and Vets. We appreciate the flexibility of King County in the use of the Senior and Vets levy funds.

Who is participating in EATS?

Seniors connected through the Des Moines Senior Activity Center and our veteran members at LiUNA! Local #242. Restaurants that are interested in partnering with the City are encouraged to reach out.

From the Mayor

The Coronavirus pandemic has been the greatest challenge we have faced in recent memory, but I want you to know that even during this time of worldwide crisis, the business of our City goes on. I want to

assure you that your City team is doing everything possible to provide you and all our residents with the services that you expect, within the constraints established by the Governor and our public health officials. The focus of all our efforts and actions is safety first.

Here are some illustrations of where we are as a result of the pandemic.

On March 5, 2020, the City Manager issued a Proclamation of Emergency. This proclamation authorizes the City Manager to request any state or federal assistance needed as well as to take appropriate measures to respond to the threat of COVID-19 and to protect the public health and safety of the City's residents and employees.

During these times our police officers, in cooperation with South King Fire & Rescue, have been responding to emergencies jointly. The partnership between the two agencies helps to ensure all situations are addressed safely, protecting both the first responders and our citizens. Our public works employees continue responding to roads that require action and permits are still being processed to the greatest extent possible, consistent with Governor Inslee's requirements for essential activities. All other essential functions of local government are still occurring. Please note that because we are in uncharted territory and trying to function in the face of a global pandemic, we are having to work in new, innovative and safe ways.

At present, all City buildings are closed to the public and most employees have found ways to work remotely. I am proud of our staff in the way they have all continued to work hard for you, our residents. As part of Governor Inslee's Washington's Phased Approach to reopening businesses and modifying physical distancing measures some outdoor recreation activities have been opened (hunting, fishing, golf, boating and hiking). The Redondo beach has been opened and parking in the Redondo lot is restricted to truck and trailer combinations at this time, single vehicles parking at Redondo and parking

at the Marina and Beach Park continue to be closed. These steps were felt necessary to assure compliance with six foot social distancing recommendations and to help protect our City. The Governor has said that if you need to drive to the park, the park is too far. We also know that most of our visitors that come to the Marina, Beach Park and Redondo live outside the City. Our intention is to help flatten the curve of COVID-19 infections and fatalities. We appreciate the continued support of our residents for having to make these very difficult but necessary changes.

The City Council is conducting meetings telephonically and per Governor Inslee's Proclamation 20-28, relating to the Open Public Meetings Act and Public Records Act, the City Council has been very limited on the type of matters they can take action on. I look forward to when Council will be able to meet all together again.

At the time of writing this article, the state is still under Governor Inslee's "Stay Home-Stay Healthy" order. We had to make some tough decisions. Because we are still uncertain about the coming weeks, we have decided to not print the "Rec 'n Roll" section of the City Currents. This section usually advertises all classes, programs and special events through Parks, Recreation & Senior Services. Since there are many unknowns about what the limitations will be related to gatherings and programs, decisions will need to be made as more information is available. Our primary concern in these decisions is always the safety of our community. Staff will continue to work at navigating how we step into summer. Please check our website and social media pages for any updates to our future classes, programs and activities.

Some have asked how they can help during this time. Some are better able to help monetarily and some better able to offer their time. It is up to the individual as to how they feel they can contribute.

Monetarily:

Consider donating to the local food bank, women and children's shelters, senior

centers, or homeless shelters, as these are typical areas of need. One could also order/purchase PPE (personal protection equipment). You might not receive the order right away, but the need will be around for a fair amount of time. You can donate PPE to first responder organizations, grocery workers, food bank workers, neighbors or other places where PPE helps keep people safe. You can also support local businesses through restaurant take-out and the purchase of gift cards. A comprehensive list of local restaurants can be found in this issue and on the City's website. Alternatively, take a moment to think about those who cut your hair or provide other services. Consider purchasing gift cards for use at a later date when businesses are back open. If contributing your time is more desirable, there are several options for you: Volunteer at your local food bank. Oftentimes the need to help with packaging and delivering to patrons is a greater challenge for them.

Offer to pick up groceries or prescriptions for an elderly neighbor or high risk person. Check in on people just so they know they are being thought of, especially those who may live alone and don't have many others to talk to. Keep an eye on the older generation who are not necessarily computer literate. They may need help to order and pick up meals or household items.

The key is to help those around you in any way you can. Together, we will get through this.

I encourage all of you to stay informed, safe and healthy. We are making positive progress, but now is the time to stay the course and not let up on our efforts to protect each other. On the following pages you can learn more about the specific actions we have taken on behalf of our community.

Our Community remains strong and resilient. I look forward to when we can return to normal operations.

Covid-19 Actions

WE WANT TO BRING YOU UP TO SPEED

with a number of actions taken by the City to increase safety and address the public health crisis we face. Below, you will find more information and resources regarding the pandemic.

Clearly, this is a very challenging time for all of us. Safety has been our watchword in all the actions we have taken. All of us have been challenged to assure for our personal safety, the safety of our families and loved ones and for our customers and colleagues at work.

The City of Des Moines was early to respond to COVID-19. After the acute nature of events at the Kirkland senior facility, King County and the State of Washington also moved forward aggressively to protect our state. Steps that Des Moines took include the following:

- On March 5th, the City issued an Emergency Proclamation regarding COVID-19
- The City instituted telecommuting options for eligible staff
- The City began closing City facilities to the public after trying out different scenarios for screening visitors
- Initiated deep cleaning in our facilities.
- The City closed all facilities to the public
- Instituted daily health screenings for employees at City facilities
- The Joint Emergency Operations Center (EOC) at Fire Station 67 (223rd and 24th) was activated. City staff (Shannon Kirchberg, our Emergency Preparedness Manager and Dan Brewer, Chief Operations Officer) and other City staff, along with Des Moines Police and South King Fire and Rescue coordinated their response efforts through the EOC
 - The activation of the EOC provides enhanced communication and coordination with partner agencies, King County Emergency Operations Center, public health agencies and others to provide a coordinated response to COVID-19
 - The EOC is constantly working to assure the availability of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for our first responders
- We have conducted daily briefings with the EOC to identify outstanding issues, update status reports and identify future actions

These are some of the significant steps we have taken in response to COVID-19.

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Economic Development

THE PANDEMIC IS WREAKING HAVOC

with the global, national and local economies. There has been huge unemployment and business closures, in order to comply with public health requirements designed to stop the spread of the virus. Everyone is challenged by this economic contraction.

The role of the City of Des Moines, in the first instance was to support our first responders (fire, police and emergency medical); stand up the Emergency Operations Center to enhance coordination, communication and collaboration between first responders, our partner agencies, King County Emergency Operations Center, public health and state officials. We also took a number of measures described in other parts of this City Currents edition.

This emergency event is unique because we do not yet know the depth of the impacts or the solution to end the pandemic while retaining a healthy economy. This will be our next challenge. Emergency management begins with addressing the acute nature of the pandemic. Controlling the spread of the virus.

The next step is called recovery, where efforts are made to return to normalcy. One very tricky part about the pandemic is that these are uncharted waters, we do not know what the new “normalcy,” will be. Nonetheless, we must prepare.

The City of Des Moines is closely monitoring and identifying the availability of resources, especially from the federal funding packages that may be available for our businesses.

Below, you can see a summary. As we are able to move into recovery, City staff will be able to provide resource lists and referrals to assist with economic recovery for our local businesses.



Resources for Small Business Owners

- **The Federal CARES Act has billions of dollars in loans available for small businesses across the country.**¹

The \$2 trillion Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act



that Congress passed on March 27 has billions of dollars set aside for businesses and private nonprofits with 500 or fewer employees.

- **Free webinars are available to help businesses understand and access the CARES Act.**²

The Port of Seattle has put together a number of educational sessions to help small businesses pinpoint how the relief bill can assist them.

- **REACH King County's Working Washington Small Business Emergency Grant Program.**³

This local program assists small-businesses severely impacted by COVID-19, and it helps mitigate impact and avoid closures by providing one-time awards of up to \$10,000 per business.

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Minor Home Repair

The City of Des Moines is once again providing minor home repair services to City resident homeowners who have “extremely low” to “low” incomes based on U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines. This is done by providing free repair services to improve the health and safety of our residents as they live in their homes. Funding for this program is provided by a Community Development Block Grant through King County.

Services provided include but are not limited to:

Electrical – faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans

Plumbing – faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters

Disability Aids – installation of grab bars, hand rails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non-skid surfaces

Safety – installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms and locksets

Other – faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

How do I qualify for these free services

1. Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months, have proof of home owner’s insurance, and meet the HUD income guidelines for the program.
2. Complete the application process

How do I apply?

To apply for this program please follow these directions:

1. Request an application by calling (206) 870-6535
2. Complete the application forms and return them with the supporting documentation to the City of Des Moines/ Minor Home Repair at: 21630 11th Avenue S, Suite D, Des Moines WA 98198.
3. Once your application is processed and evaluated you will receive a phone call informing you of your acceptance or non-eligibility for our program. Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. Services that are required for your health and/or safety are the highest priority.



STREET BANNER PROGRAM

Along Marine View Drive, cross streets and areas of 7th Avenue, are colorful banners promoting local businesses. The banners are fade-resistant and made from a heavy 22-ounce vinyl. Each banner is \$275 for one year with an annual renewal fee of \$175.
