

IT HAS ALMOST BEEN ONE YEAR that I have had the honor and privilege to serve as your Mayor and I would like to take this opportunity to take a look back at where we have been and also highlight

our direction for the future. At this time last year, the City Council was considering a budget that required staff lay-offs, an understaffed police force, and employee furloughs for 2016 in order to be sustainable going forward into 2017. Based on the actions that this Council has taken since that time, the employee furloughs were able to be cancelled mid-year, one new additional police officer was hired with two more new faces to start in 2017, exciting new economic development is being realized, and the City Council is preparing to adopt a sustainable balanced budget for the coming year. I am looking forward to the near future when people no longer look at our City and say that "Des Moines has such great potential." Let me

y, as your Mayor, it is my goal that the word potential" no longer is used to describe our city as we are now achieving and realizing our potential!

With that said let us take a look at some of the major things happening in the city.

SUSTAINABLE BUDGETING

The budget process for 2017 began in August at our annual budget retreat where the City Council reviewed our five year budget outlook. The 2017 budget is significantly different from past budgets as it presents a sustainable budget; one which does not rely on "one-time" money to pay for on-going spending. It had been anticipated in 2015 that a significant budget shortfall would occur in 2017. The City Council and I left no stone unturned to identify and implement new and necessary sources of revenue. After much effort and success, the picture of the City's finances has changed considerably. The 2017 Budget identifies sustainable, recurring revenues to pay for all recurring expenditures while creating a General Fund ending fund balance of nearly 3 million dollars (meeting our minimum fund balance levels). In the long term, the city still faces financial 'hallenges with variable revenue sources

ပ်m development projects and state shared revenues, as well as the continuing escalation

of costs relating to medical and retirement compensation costs. However, the annual budgetary shortfalls experienced over the past decade have largely been eliminated and the five year budget outlook is strong.

FRANCHISE AGREEMENTS

I am pleased to announce the successful negotiation of new 10 year franchise agreements with Highline Water District, Midway Sewer District, and Southwest Suburban Sewer District. These agreements were mutually negotiated with the Districts over a span of several months and have now been approved by the Districts' Boards and the City Council. These agreements call for the collection by the City of a franchise payment to be used for maintaining and enhancing streets and roadway infrastructure within the City. The agreements require increased communication and cooperation between the City and the Districts to ensure mutual benefit and a great working relationship that will continue throughout the term of the agreements and beyond.

REBUILDING OF THE REDONDO BOARDWALK

After the Redondo boardwalk was essentially destroyed in a major storm in late 2014, the City worked extremely hard to partner with our legislative representatives and state, federal and local agencies, to receive significant resources to rebuild the boardwalk. The November 5, 2016 dedication ceremony for the rebuilt and reenforced boardwalk was only made possible because of the partnerships with elected officials at many levels of government. With the support of our partners, the city was able to complete this \$4 million dollar plus venture with only about 10% of the cost coming from the City. Our City staff led the effort and we are extremely proud of the outcome.

NEW CITY MANAGER ANNOUNCEMENT

Another major development that I am extremely pleased to announce is the installment of our new City Manager, Michael Matthias. Michael was selected in August as the new City Manager subject to contract approval and has been the Interim City Manager during that time. Michael has been with the City since 2014 when he was hired as the Assistant City Manager with an emphasis on economic development. He has a very accomplished professional and academic career with over 23 years of local government experience.

Academically, he holds a Master of Science in Sustainable Urban Development from the University of Oxford, England, a Master of Science in Applied Economics Let me say, as your Mayor, it is my goal that the word "potential" no longer is used to describe our city as we are now achieving and realizing our potential!

from the University of California, Santa Cruz, a Master of International Relations from the University of Cambridge, England, and Bachelor of Arts in Honors Political Science from the University of California, Santa Barbara. He is also a Robert F. Kennedy Fellow recipient for his work with low income families to increase the quality of public education and healthcare.

His prior professional experience includes service as an Emergency Management official, Acting City Manager, Economic Development Director, Budget Manager and a private sector Financial Analyst.

Michael has the full support and confidence of the City Council and we are excited about the numerous positive activities and developments going on in the City. The Council would also like to thank all of our staff and community members for their support through this process and for their continuing efforts to lead Des Moines into its bright future!

FUTURE

It's a new day in Des Moines. There are a number of other projects and activities that we are working on that will move the City forward. This section of the City Currents will continue to be used to provide our citizens with information and updates on the many updates and developments throughout the City. Housing Repair Assistance Program

The City of Des Moines is once again providing minor home repair services to City resident homeowners who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes based on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines. This is done by providing free repair services to improve the health and safety of our residents as they live in their homes.

SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE:

- Electrical faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans
- Plumbing faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters
- Disability Aids installation of grab bars, handrails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of non-skid surfaces
- Safety installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms & locksets
- Other faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

HOW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE FREE SERVICES?

- Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city Ilmits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months and have proof of homeowner's insurance
- 2. Complete the application process



Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. 
Fun-loving **Rita and Scott Eliason** have been volunteers for twelve years. Rita is a treasured fixture at the hostess table. "I love coming here," she tells me. "Everyone is so friendly." I observe how much she adds as the first greeter, all smiles, and she seems to know everyone's name. Ask her anything, I think she should be on JEOPARDY.

Scott is the driver of our much needed Hyde shuttle bus and does so with his

A slim energetic, fast stepping woman came into the Center for the



Mystery of Poverty Bay Bacteria

The Washington State Department of Health (DOH) recently lowered the water quality score for Poverty Bay due to increased levels of fecal bacteria in the water. As a result, geoducks can no longer be harvested by the Puyallup Tribe for half of the year. But where is the bacteria coming from?

This Puget Sound shoreline has been a productive traditional shellfish harvest area. European homesteaders arrived in the 1870's and over the years the surrounding landscape has changed. Runoff may be carrying waste from pets, wildlife, rats, or birds into the sound. Other possible sources of fecal coliform bacteria could include leaking septic systems or sewer lines.


The DOH, the cities of Federal Way and Des Moines, King County's Stormwater Services Section, the Tribes, and the University of Washington are teaming up in an effort to solve the mystery. Samples are being taken from streams to track down potential sources, and testing is being conducted to find out which creatures the bacteria is coming from. With clues like location, source, and maybe weather, the team can then identify tools to reduce or prevent the bacteria from getting in the Sound.

Please Call Me An Animal Care and Control Officer, Not A "Dawg Ketcher!

GONE ARE THE DAYS OF THE "DAWG KETCHER", Thank Goodness! Back in the late 1800's and early 1900's, when rabies was rampant and packs of feral dogs roamed

neighborhoods, men were hired to round up the unruly beasts for public health and safety reasons. Jokes were made about how lowly the position was, and folks would say such comments as "he couldn't even be a dog catcher!" Cartoons of a stupid-looking guy swinging a big net and chasing a little dog were common, and many folks thought of the job as one that only a loser would take.

Fast forward to 2016, thankfully everything has changed! The way I do my job is very different than it was 100 or so years ago. I am an Animal Care and Control Officer, I take pride in my profession, and I am educated, skilled,

and proficient in my career choice. And I LOVE animals!!! I even get to have my little dog "Daisy" ride with me in my truck every day on duty; I joke that she is my "Public Relations Director", because she is so friendly and makes everyone smile!

The way we run our Animal Care and Control program here in Des Moines is based on education, encouraging compliance with the animal codes to keep pets and the public safe, and working with the community to prevent and solve issues. We care deeply for our pets, we are humane, and we encourage responsible pet ownership by teaching pet owners how to care for their animals. We do presentations on how to properly and safely greet a dog, how to humanely obedience train our dogs, and how to choose a pet carefully and wisely, knowing that it is a lifetime commitment.

I mainly deal with dogs, and occasionally cats, but over the years I have also dealt with ostriches, emus, peacocks, llamas, alpacas, snakes, lizards, rats, hedgehogs, mice, rabbits, monkeys, kangaroos, foxes, coyotes, raccoons, otters, eagles, hawks, owls, horses, cows, goats, sheep, chickens, geese, pigeons...





When I get called about a friendly loose dog roaming a neighborhood, I do NOT want to impound it if possible. I want it back home where it is safe with its family! I will often tell loose dogs to "Go Home" and clap my hands, and then I follow them home and contact the owners. Then we try to determine how the dog got out and fix the problem so it doesn't happen again!

The main reason we require pet licensing, is so dogs and cats always have ID on them. That way, if they get lost and then found, we can quickly get them back home because we have the owner information. We do our pet licensing through our Police Department, which is open 24/7, so we are always available when someone has lost or found a pet.

Even without a license tag on, we have situations where someone calls us that they have found a dog and are willing to keep it at their home, which we are happy about. Later, someone will call us that they have lost a dog fitting that description. We can then connect the two so that the dog owner can get their dog back. The finder is happy that they could help, and the dog never has to be impounded. It is a win-win-win!

We also utilize social media to help reunite lost and found pets. What a change from 100 years ago!

The gift of a small toy, blanket or stuffed animal during their visits may bring some joy to their otherwise stressful and unpleasant situation.



Ask an Ecologist

How can I help the journey of Des Moines Creek salmon?

Fall's changing colors and seasonal rains represent homecoming for students, friends and families at holiday gatherings, and native fish returning to their natal streams. Des Moines Creek (DMC) is home to coho and chum salmon and cutthroat trout. You should be able to spot spawning adult coho (mid-October through November) and chum (mid-November through December), especially in the lower reach of DMC.

Anadromous salmon endure a long journey from freshwater creeks to the ocean and back again. Too, some are helped along by volunteers such as Trout Unlimited (TU). Since 1983, TU has worked with Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife to supplement our local creeks with coho. TU operates a fish hatchery at Southwest Suburban Sewer District on Miller-Walker Creek, where in December they receive and rear about 120,000 coho eggs from the Soos Creek hatchery. Sometime in January, after the yolk sacs are fully absorbed, half of the fry are released into DMC and the other half are split between Miller and Walker Creeks. Coho spend a year in freshwater and two years in saltwater before returning to our creeks, while chum migrate out soon after hatching and spend from three to five years in saltwater.

TU also receives about 30,000 coho yearlings in January from the Soos Creek hatchery. They are raised and fed twice daily in 400 sq ft net pens at the Des Moines Marina where their location is naturally "imprinted" on them until their release between April and mid-May. Often when they return to spawn in the fall they can be seen swimming around the boat dock, in search of DMC.

In 2012, King County and community volunteers conducted a spawning salmon survey of DMC from Puget Sound up to Marine View Drive. Results showed about 60% of all coho carcasses were hatchery origin (unclipped fins), 34% were TU penraised outplants (clipped fins) and 6% were unknown.

Still, the salmon need our help. Sadly, most of our returning coho experience prespawn mortality (PSM), dying before they're able to spawn.

PSM is a regional problem that affects many urban streams. Research shows that PSM is heavily linked to stormwater runoff from major roads and highways, but the combination of pollutants causing PSM is still unknown (Scholz et al 2011). Unusual, symptomatic fish behaviors include gaping mouths, splayed fins, lost orientation (not oriented toward flow), and swimming sideways or in circles at the surface. Some fish show little movement when approached, making them easy targets for predators.

However, there is good news. Recent habitat, flow and passage improvements have brought coho 2-1/2 miles up Des

Moines Creek, and for the first time, chum were observed a mile upstream. And though the combination of pollutants contributing to PSM are unknown, studies suggest the pollutants may be removed as road runoff and surface water is run through a soil column. You can help the fish by being conscientious about water quality: keep pollutants off roads and out of ditches, catch-basins, drainages and ultimately our streams which link us and the fish to Puget Sound.



Applicants meeting eligibility guidelines are awarded up to \$150 per quarter per calendar year. Eligible residents will be required to provide proof of identification, residency, and income. Scholarship applicants must be approved prior to registration.




