FALL IS FINALLY
HERE after a magnificent
summer in Des Moines.
I would like to focus
this article on a recount
and update on a great
number of significant

accomplishments made over the past year. First and foremost, for the second year in a row the City has established and maintained a sustainable budget. Our leadership team that includes the City Council, the City Manager and Administration have worked hard to assure the City is on sound financial footing. Structural revenues are balanced with structural expenditures and no one time money is being used to balance the budget. Discipline has been the foundation of our efforts, and we are moving forward in a safe and secure manner.

We have also enhanced our law enforcement and expanded our presence on a regional task force to address

'olent and gang related crime. The .noney collected from red light cameras, designated for public safety purposes, has allowed us to increase funding for law enforcement and add new faces to the Police Department. The Department has moved to a new model of policing, called Evidence Based Policing, a strategy that is described elsewhere in this edition of City Currents (page 16). One of the few budget additions in 2018 is for the City to join the regional SWAT team to assist our efforts to prevent and stop violent crime. Our Police in collaboration with the City Manager's Office, City Attorney, Code Enforcement and Public Works have developed the Pacific Ridge Strategic plan to provide multiple tools to address crime in that area and elsewhere in the City. We are moving in the right direction.

Also related to law enforcement as well as the future of the Marina, the City instituted paid parking on the Marina floor. The results have been significant. Our PD has been sweeping the parking lots at closing (10pm) every night. The gates have assisted in enforcing the 10pm nightly closure and with the assistance of additional enforcement by the Police Department, after hour's crime, noise complaints, and related incidents at the Marina have been virtually stopped. Calls for service have been cut by 60% and neighboring residences are no longer bothered by noise and illegal activity at night. Marina parking revenues from July 6, 2017 through the end of October totaled approximately \$63,888. This money will be used to repair the failing north bulkhead and assure the integrity of the Marina infrastructure for generations to come.

Recently, the City held a Marina Development Open House to provide an opportunity for our residents and those interested in Marina development to comment and provide input. We held the event aboard the Argosy boat, Goodtime II (that Argosy was kind enough to donate for the event) and almost 200 people participated. Their inputs will be compiled and utilized as we work to develop feasible plans for future Marina development. This effort is also being assisted financially by the Port of Seattle. The future of Marina development will most likely be accomplished through Public/Private partnerships. (Please see page 16, for a more complete description of this event).

The Des Moines Creek Business
Park is in full swing. The new Federal
Aviation Administration building is near
completion and the FAA employees will
start populating the building in late January,
2018. Approximately 4,000 new jobs will
be located in the City of Des Moines as the
Business Park is completed.

In order to provide access to the downtown and Marina for these new workers, the City has partnered with King County METRO to implement a Community Connections pilot Program that will provide multi-modal access from the new Angle Lake Light Rail Station through the Business Park, down 216th, stopping at Wesley Homes and then into the downtown, the Marina and then back to the Business Park and Angle Lake Light Rail Station. This will provide opportunities for Business Park employees to come downtown, enjoy a meal and other retail options and then return to the Business Park without the need to bring a car downtown.

Several exciting development projects are also underway including the renovation of the Des Moines Theater and a mixed use project located at the "Pit," just south of Wally's on Marine View Drive.

The extension of improvements to 216th will be starting soon as well. This extension will start just west of the Post Office and move down the hill. This improvement will help create a Gateway to the downtown.

A few other items that are worth mentioning: In August, a number of City staff travelled to Emmitsburg, Maryland to attend the National Institute for Emergency Management. This training will enhance our capacity to respond to any emergency management incidents in our city or region. Emergency management preparedness is an ongoing activity and our staff and City Council will continue our efforts to assure we are ready for any incident that may occur.

Finally, in September, the City purchased the Van Gasken property, located at the western foot of 222nd Ave overlooking the Marina and the Puget Sound. This was done in a partnership with Forterra, a non-profit agency that participates in preserving critical urban and rural open space. They are a committed and effective environmental steward, and their participation provided support for the City to acquire this beautiful property for generations to come.

The City is in good hands and moving forward. I wish you a wonderful holiday season and look forward to the opportunities we have to make our City the best it can possibly be.


years. Committee members may serve a maximum of two full terms. The committee meets approximately six times per year.





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Ecology Projects For Airport Communities

Diverse Community Organizations Receive Funding

SEATTLE — A robot to tend a community garden, battling invasive species, tree planting, and a public art project celebrating the area's seafaring heritage are among the 11 projects that received funding from the Port of Seattle today. The Port awarded the first grants under its new Airport Community Ecology (ACE) Fund Small Matching Grants Program to assist communities around Seattle-Tacoma International Airport.

The organizations received a share of the initial \$85,900 in grants awarded by the program. For each dollar awarded under the program, recipients must demonstrate three dollars in value to the community, according to state law. All grants received the full amount requested.

"We are proud to be able to fund this first round of grants under our innovative Small Matching Grants Program," said Port Commissioner John Creighton. "The Port of Seattle recognizes how important it is to be a good neighbor, and these programs reflect the best spirit of collaboration between the Airport and the cities of SeaTac, Burien and Des Moines."

Creighton added, "I am pleased with the number of applications and strength and diversity of the programs being funded in the initial round of grants. Together we're going to make these funds benefit the environment and quality of life in all three communities."

The Airport Community Ecology (ACE) Fund offers grants to organizations to improve the natural environment through projects and programs that improve livability in near-airport communities.

The \$1 million ACE Fund was authorized by the Port of Seattle Commission in November 2016 in recognition that neighboring communities that experience more impacts from airport operations should also experience additional benefits. The Commission directed that the program support environmental projects and programs in the cities of Burien, Des Moines and SeaTac.

A total of \$550,000 in the ACE Fund Small Matching Grants Program will be distributed to community organizations over the course of three years (2017-2020). The next grant cycle will begin in January 2018 with awards to be distributed in the spring. The remaining ACE Fund program dollars will be distributed as part of the Green Cities Partnership Program to help cities start initiatives to expand and nurture urban forest.

Here are the specific Des Moines grant recipients and their projects:

1. FARMBOT – ECOTECH IN AN URBAN GARDEN, KEY TECH LABS, DES MOINES (\$3,250).

This project will combine STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) and healthy food education by teaching youth how to build a robot which will tend a community garden in Des Moines' high poverty area of Pacific Ridge.

2. BEACH HEROES, ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE CENTER, ALL CITIES (\$10,000).

Grant will sustain program's ability to partner with Highline School District teachers to bring 1,200 students to an education center at Burien's Seahurst Park.

3. MIDWAY COMMUNITY GARDEN, REACH OUT DES MOINES, DES MOINES (\$1,150).

Grant funds will be used to acquire materials to start constructing the Midway Park Community Garden project in Des Moines.

4. **STORMFEST**, FUTUREWISE, ALL CITIES (\$10,000).

This program aims at increasing Highline Public Schools students' understanding of stormwater, reduce behaviors contributing to pollution and inspire stewardship long-term by providing hands-on, experiential education.

Grant funds will support the development of a neighborhood history research project that will inform the design of the new Neighborhood Heritage Garden.

5. PUGET SOUND ENVIRONMENTAL SCULPTURE, DES MOINES LEGACY FOUNDATION, DES MOINES (\$10,000).

The grant enables the Foundation to collaborate with a local artist and community partners to create a public art sculpture to be located on the Des Moines waterfront.

6. INVASIVE WEED REMOVAL AND AWARENESS CAMPAIGN, FRIENDS OF SALTWATER STATE PARK, DES MOINES (\$1,500).

This project aims to remove invasive ivy and other species that are taking over Saltwater State Park to improve health of existing trees, plant more trees, and create an awareness campaign regarding healthy environmental stewardship in Des Moines.

7. MIDWAY PARK & PLAY AREA RESTORATION, DES MOINES ROTARY FOUNDATION, DES MOINES (\$10,000).

The grant provides funds that enable volunteers to repair and maintain park equipment to enhance the beauty and recreational value of the park for youth and families to enjoy.

DID YOU KNOW?

TO BETTER INFORM our residents the City of Des Moines went through a series of "Communication Upgrades" over this past year.

IN JANUARY, Council and Staff met with a Communications Consultant who recommended ways to inform, respond and engage with the public in a more informative and transparent manner. At the same time the City launched a re-design of their website. Staff is currently working on Push Notifications and hope to be ready to launch in early 2018.

T'SEYER LIWHERE

GRAFFITI IS DEFINITELY A PROBLEM HERE IN DES MOINES AND IT'S EVERYWHERE from North Hill down to Redondo. But, graffiti is not new. Graffiti existed in Ancient Egypt, Ancient Greece, and the Roman Empire. Graffiti taggers (the person(s) who write the graffiti) back then did not have magic markers and cans of spray paint, but found other ways to disfigure property.

What is Graffiti?

The Des Moines Municipal Code
(DMMC) Section 7.40.010 defines
"Graffiti" as "... unauthorized
markings, inscriptions, words, figures,
designs, or other inscribed material visible from premises
open to the public, that have been placed upon any
property through the use of paint, ink, chalk, dye, or
other substance capable of marking property." Typical tools
the trade include spray paint, paint sticks, magic markers,
etching equipment, or other objects capable of defacing property.
Besides damaging property; graffiti also reduces property values.

Who is doing it and why?

Street gangs use words, insignias, and symbols to mark their territories, send messages, and intimidate rival gangs and community residents. Graffiti is often referred to as "Tagging". But, gangs are not the only "Taggers". Others create graffiti because they and their friends think it's cool and it gets recognition from their peers. Anyone who has some type of message they want to put on public display will use "Tagging" to get their message out.

Report It

If you see "Tagging" in progress, call 911. Give the dispatcher the location, description of the "Tagger," the vehicle, bike or means of transportation, and if the "Tagger" is leaving—their direction. **DO NOT try and intervene**. If reporting while in your vehicle, pull off the road to a safe area and then call 911. **DO NOT** call while you are operating your vehicle.

If you see graffiti on any property, take a picture, if possible, of the vandalism and report it by sending the picture and location by e-mail to graffiti@desmoineswa.gov. The graffiti will be checked out and action will eventually be taken. If the graffiti is on your private property, please take a picture of it and file an on-line vandalism crime report at desmoineswa.gov/363/Online-Crime-Reporting as the "Tagging" is considered a crime. Then, remove the graffiti as quickly as possible.





Removing Graffiti

If the graffiti is on your property, report it and then remove it as soon as possible.

esearch shows that prompt removal sults in lower rates of recurrence.

How to clean up the graffiti? It all depends on the surface type (concrete/brick, wood, metal, glass, etc.) and the mechanism of the graffiti (paint, marker, ink, etching, etc.). Pressure washing, sandblasting, painting over, wire brush, paint remover/thinner, alcohol wipes, and commercial graffiti removal products can be used. Be careful and heed the warnings on the cleaning products. Some products can be hazardous to your health if used improperly.

Failing to remove graffiti within 7 days of being notified, or after actual knowledge of the graffiti, or if you reasonably should have known of the graffiti on your property; can result in **monetary penalties**.

Preventing Graffiti

One tool in the prevention of further graffiti is the prompt removal of any graffiti. Good lighting can make it easier to catch "Taggers" in the act and also scare away potential burglars. Rough surfaces rather than smooth surfaces deter graffiti. Landscaping can also restrict access to walls and fences, which are prime targets for graffiti.

ant to do more? Partner With Us.

Graffiti clean-up on public property and notification for graffiti on private property is done primarily by volunteers. We have a graffiti patrol staffed entirely by volunteers who use a police volunteer vehicle to search out graffiti, photograph the same, and inform property owners/tenants on graffiti issues and removal. Volunteer applications can be picked up at the Des Moines Police Department (21900 11th Avenue South) or on-line at www.desmoineswa.gov/ DocumentCenter/View/77. Citizens can also report graffiti on-line by email at graffiti@ desmoineswa.gov. Provide a picture of the graffiti, the address/location, description of the graffiti, and other details to help the police or graffiti patrol identify the graffiti.

Opioid Abuse, Straight to the Point



Des Moines Legacy Foundation Annual LEGACY Award


THE DES MOINES LEGACY FOUNDATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Leash Laws

MANY (IF NOT ALL!) OF US WHO WORK FOR THE CITY OF DES MOINES LOVE ANIMALS! And, as pet owners ourselves, we understand that we want our doggies to get needed exercise and have lots of active playtime..."a tired dog is a good dog!" Taking our canine companions for daily walks, and playing with them in our own yards and homes are great ways to burn off excess energy. Participating in training classes, dog shows and trials, charity walks, and many other dog-friendly activities are also good ways to have our dogs be active. For those who enjoy taking Rover to off-leash dog parks, Grandview Dog Park http://grandviewoffleash.org/in nearby SeaTac is a frequent choice.

We have a leash law in Des Moines, so dogs are not allowed to run at large — this includes city parks and the Marina.

PARKS AND RECREATION 19.08.030 REGULATIONS AND PROHIBITED ACTIVITIES.


(3) No person shall allow or permit an animal under that person's control to run

at large in parks, or enter a lake, pond, fountain, or stream therein except in designated areas identified with signage or without first obtaining a written permit from the City Manager or the City Manager's designee. A person whose animal is in a Des Moines park is responsible for removing feces deposited by such animal from the park.

HARBORS 15.04.440 DOGS.

All dogs on marina property shall be under control by leash. The owners of such dogs shall be responsible for the proper cleanup and disposal of animal wastes. Violation of this section shall subject the animal to impounding by proper authority and criminal prosecution of the owner. Redemption of the animal shall be dependent upon payment of costs and fees and other applicable provisions of Title 8 DMMC.

I get ongoing citizen complaints- many from dog owners who obey the leash law themselves who are concerned about other dog owners who let their dogs run off-leash in those areas. I often get complaints about

n DOG WASTE CAN HARM YOUR HEALTH

Unlike other sources adding to water poliution, such as lawn fertilizer, rinse water from driveways and motor oil, dog waste carries parasites and bacteria that can be transmitted directly to humans and make them sick.



The longer dog waste stays on the ground, the greater a contamination becomes.



Roundworm is one of the most common parasites found in dog waste. It can remain infectious in contaminated soil and water for years. A recent CDC study found 14 percent of Americans tested positive for roundworms.

when someone is having a pleasant time walking their dog on leash, when suddenly they are startled (and sometimes frightened) by an off-leash dog that comes charging up to them, only to have the offending dog owner say "Oh it's OK, he's friendly!" The truth is, most people really do NOT like that. And whether the dog is "friendly" or not, it can still cause a huge problem- we have had cases where a big, friendly dog came running up to someone who then fell and was injured. Or their leashed dog became frightened, and broke away from them and ran off due to fear.

So although I am extremely busy with calls, I do patrol those areas when time allows. Fines for dog violations in city parks are \$291 per count, and fines for dog violations in the Marina are \$513 per count. In addition, the violating dogs may be impounded, although generally we prefer to have the dogs' owner get their dogs under proper leash control rather than impounding them.

Please be a responsible pet owner and don't let your dog be an annoyance (or a danger) to other citizens. Not only is it breaking the law, it is impolite and inconsiderate! We all (two-legged and fourlegged) want to enjoy our beautiful city of Des Moines in peace. Thanks!

Housing Repair Assistance Program

THE CITY OF DES MOINES IS ONCE GAIN PROVIDING minor home repair services to City resident homeowners who have "extremely low" to "low" incomes based on U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines. This is done by providing free repair services to improve the health and safety of our residents as they live in their homes. Funding for this program is provided by a Community Development Block Grant through King County.

SERVICES PROVIDED INCLUDE BUT ARE NOT LIMITED TO:

ELECTRICAL - faulty lights, switches, plugs, circuits or exhaust fans

PLUMBING - faulty toilets, clogged drains, leaking faucets, faulty water heaters

DISABILITY AIDS - installation of grab bars, hand rails, hand held showerheads, bath seats, high toilets, access ramps and application of nonskid surfaces

SAFETY - installation of smoke alarms, security/safety lights, carbon monoxide alarms and locksets

OTHER - faulty furnaces, faulty gutters and roof leaks, broken window glass panes

OW DO I QUALIFY FOR THESE FREE SERVICES?

- Be an owner/occupant within the Des Moines city limits for at least one year with no intention of selling in the next 12 months, have proof of home owner's insurance, and meet the HUD income guidelines for the program.
- Complete the application process

HOW DO I APPLY?

To apply for this program please follow these directions:

- Request an application by calling 206-870-6535
- Complete the application forms and return them with the supporting documentation to the City of Des Moines/Minor Home Repair at: 21630 11th Ave S Ste. D Des Moines WA 98198
- Once your application is processed and evaluated you will receive a phone call informing you of your acceptance or non-eligibility for our program. Upon acceptance your job will be referred to one of our contractors who will call you to make an appointment to perform those services. Services that are required for your health and/or safety are the highest priority.

CELBRATING THE GATEWAY

The City of Des Moines hosted the GATEWAY Celebration on October 12, 2017 acknowledging the ongoing partnerships that have resulted in significant improvements to S. 216th Street and 24th Avenue S. The improvements are helping transform the City by stimulating economic development and creating a more vibrant, sustainable economy for our citizens.

Included were Federal, state, regional and local and private funding partners. Washington State and federal granting agencies included the Transportation Improvement Board, the Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board and the Washington State Department of Transportation/FHWA. They assisted in financing of widening of S. 216th Street Segments 1-A, & 2, Segment 3 (2019) as well as the 24th/28th Avenue connection. By the end of 2019, S. 216th Street will be fully improved with continuous sidewalks and bicycle lanes between Marine View Drive and Pacific Highway S. State Representative Mia Gregerson attended and was acknowledged for her support of the improvements within Des Moines and the City of SeaTac. The City provided matching resources for public funds.

Regional funding partners include the Port of Seattle who helped secure significant funding for Des Moines Creek Business Park

frontage improvements Dave McFadden. Port of Seattle Economic Development Director made a presentation on behalf of Commissioner Jim Creighton acknowledging success of the partnership.

Bill Bryant, Metro Service Development Manager, announced launch of a "Community Connections" shuttle that will begin frequent peak period operation by the end of January, 2018 linking the Angle Lake Station, DMCBP and the downtown Marina District. King County Metro also partnered in funding upgrade of fiber optic/ITS signal systems as well as transit stop and solar shelter improvements.

Panattoni Development Company is the major private investor who anchored the City's Gateway by constructing DMCBP Phases I, II III (completed) and Phase IV (2018). Donnie Belk made a presentation acknowledging the influence of the public infrastructure investment on decision making. These investments had a significant bearing on the GSA/FAA selection of DMCBP as their new regional headquarters becoming the largest single employer in the City when they relocate about 1600 employees to the site early in 2018. The DMCBP is expected to add up to 2,400 new jobs to the City within the next year.

Councilmember Dave Kaplan expressed the City's Council's appreciation and ongoing support for the project experienced over his 20 year tenure. A ribbon cutting was held at the intersection of S. 216th Street and 24th Avenue S as a tribute to completion of the Gateway's signature transportation segment between Pacific Highway S. and S. 216th Street.





Marina Development Open House Public Input Summary

THE MARINA DEVELOPMENT OPEN HOUSE was held on October 17, 2017 aboard the donated Argosy boat the *Goodtime II*, moored at the Des Moines Marina. The Des Moines community provided input at this well-attended event related to potential Marina redevelopment, expressing preferences for uses such as restaurants and retail shops, and their potential locations.


The Marina redevelopment project is entering its second phase, with assistance from two Port of Seattle Economic
Partnership grants. The first phase of the project examined the feasibility of Marina redevelopment, evaluated parking demand and undertook an economic demand analysis. The consultant's final report for Phase I was presented to the City Council on May 18, 2017. The second phase will build on the previous feasibility work, consider financial and market



factors, utilize the public input from the Community Open House, and result in a financially feasible conceptual plan. Subsequent phases will include City plan/regulation updates and environmental

review with an accompanying public process, and market-driven plan implementation.

IN EARLY 2017, THE POLICE DEPARTMENT obtained Command Central Analytics which is a "cloud"-based solution to enhance the agency's ability to make better intelligence-led decisions at every level. It unifies all of their available crim and calls for service data into intuitiviews to help make more sense of activity. They are able to recognize patterns quickly and drill down into the details of recurring problems.


In addition, the Police Department instituted an Evidence-Based Policing model. Evidence-Based Policing means that research, evaluation, analysis and scientific process are always considered in the department's decision making about tactics, personnel deployment strategies as well as policies. Evidence-Based Policing Model is a proactive approach to policing. It's tailored, focused, and can be placed oriented as opposed to only making reactive arrests. Data collection is essential for the identification of threats, trends or "Hot Spots", as well as the ability to measure success.

With the implementation of Command Central Analytics and instituting the Evidence-Based Policing model our Police Department has been successful in identifying current issues within our community and effectively addressing them. We are excited about the future and with our assistance the police departmewill continue to lead the way by addressing the quality of life issues and make the city a safer place to live, work and visit.

Art on Poverty Bay -**Outdoor Sculpture Gallery Artists Sought**

THE DES MOINES ARTS COMMIS-SION INVITES SCULPTURE ARTISTS to participate in the Outdoor Sculpture Gallery that is exhibited along the Marina District streets and at waterfront locations including the Marina, Beach Park and Redondo. POOL CLOSURE UPDATE

The Mount Rainier Pool refurbishment project is underway after encountering some unforeseen issues that required repair before reopening. When replacing the pool liner and tile surfaces this summer, severe corrosion was found in the buried drain lines (see picture) and circulation piping and the mortar bedding was found to be failing. The piping had to be replaced. Despite the challenges that the unknown issues presented, the repairs are moving forward.



The main drain and supply line had to be dug out, requiring the removal of concrete. The corroded iron pipes are being replaced with non-corrosive PVC.





The good news is that all piping has been replaced and concrete poured. The completed project will have new tile and pool shell, and increased water quality to improve user experience. The project is moving forward with an estimated re-opening in early 2018. To follow the project and re-opening check out the news section of our website www.mtrainierpool.com.
